He took passage on the Republic Tuesday morning for Portland, hatless, coatless, and shoeless.

Judge Doan visited the section of county back of Goble, last Monday, inspecting roads and bridges, and reporting that he found it necessary to make some repairs to small bridges. Manager Day, of the Goble railroad, agreed to make some needed alterations in the road where it is paralleled by his road, and other improvements are promised for the highways in that vicinity.

The Doernbecher Manufacturing Company will rebuild their hardwood saw mill, recently destroyed by fire at Rainier, in Portland. The site will be on the river, probably above the Portland flouring mills. When in operation the mill will give employment to fifteen or twenty hands and will cut all kinds of Oregon hardwood, the stumpage for a great many million feet having already been purchased by the company.

Mr. Wm. Tates, of Seaside, drove to town hurriedly Tuesday evening with his five-year-old son, who was the victim of an explosion of a dynamite cap. The fingers of the left hand were badly lacerated, and it was necessary for the physicians to remove considerable bone in order to make the necessary repairs. The little fellow had gotten hold of the cap in some way, and was attempting to explode it, the effort being successful, with the result above stated.

A ball team from this city went to Seaside last Sunday and crossed back with the nine there, and returned home defeated; however, not a stinging defeat. FOUND A NEW PASS.

Tunnel Between Seaside and Pittsburg Can Be Shortened.

Northern Pacific railway engineers, in going over the survey of the proposed extension into the Nehalem country from Seaside to Pittsburg, have discovered a new pass whereby the cost of construction has been reduced by about \$50,000. The new pass will obviate the need of the enormous expense of penetrating the mountain known as Banker hill, and it is said something like 700 feet of tunneling can be dispensed with by following the new survey. The discovery was made by a new assistant engineer brought out from the East.

The commencement of active construction work has been looked for now for about two months past, but for some reason or other it has so far resulted no further than the survey.—Wednesday's Telegram.

Official and Full Report of the Registrar July Term.

Proceedings of the county court for the regular July term, 1901.

Officers present, Hon. J. B. Doan, county judge; R. S. Hattan, and J. G. Watts, county commissioners; J. G. Watts, county clerk, and R. S. Hattan, sheriff.

Due proclamation being made the following proceedings were had:

Petition of C. O. Meyer, et al for a county road presented and read. Viewers appointed: R. Kappler, Fred Briggs and G. L. Tarbell, with A. B. Little, surveyor, to meet at Reed's logging camp, August 15th, 1901, at 9 a. m., to meet and view said proposed road.

Sheriff directed to execute a tax deed to Olave Johnson for the NW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of section 16, T 9 N, R 2 W.

Ordered by the court that upon the execution and delivery by John Dolan of a deed to the five-foot strip of land on the Bennett road, and that the clerk issue and deliver to said John Dolan a warrant in the sum of \$10.

Ordered that the costs on tax sale certificate No. 291 be remitted upon payment of the taxes for 1893, and that the clerk have credit for the same.

Ordered that tax sale certificate No. 1185 for taxes of 1892, be and the same is hereby canceled.

Ordered that tax sale certificate No. 698 be canceled and that the clerk have credit for the same.

Petition of O. E. Hunter for liquor license for six months allowed.

Ordered that the tax of B. M. Mantilla for the year 1890 be and the same is hereby remitted, as the land was assessed before proof was made.

Ordered that certificate No. 824 be assigned to John Stewart upon the payment of \$31.10.

Ordered that the time for the meeting of the board of equalization be and the same is hereby extended until the first Monday in October, 1901.

Ordered that tax sale certificate No. 1042 be canceled, and that the clerk be credited with the sum of \$6.70.

Ordered that upon the payment of \$5.04 be remitted and the clerk have credit for the same, for the taxes of 1894.

Ordered that the contract of siding in and roofing the Taylor bridge be awarded to Emery Mills for the sum of \$80.00, he being the lowest and best bidder.

Ordered that certificate No. 1041 for tax sales of 1890 be canceled and the clerk have credit for the same.

Account of sheriff and the tax roll checked up by the court.

Ordered that upon the payment of \$13.37 tax sale certificate No. 350 be canceled and the clerk have credit for \$5.90.

Ordered that tax sales certificates Nos. 1097 and 120 on tax sales of 1891 and 1893 be canceled as title had not been perfected, and that the clerk have credit for the respective amounts, \$7.39 for 1891 and \$7.42 for 1893.
