The New Logging Railway. COLUMBIA CITY, July 22--Mr. Editor: Hubert Wharton and myself have just returned from a trip of inspection of the Columbia City & Nehalem Logging Railroad, and to give you a clear idea of the work, thought it better to write a short article for the paper. The road is now graded for three miles from the river and one mile completed. The bridges are about one-half finished, and now with the help of the donkey engines, I am told by the superintendent of the road that within six weeks, logs be put into the river from the foot of Mount Reed. The Company has secured a large body of as fine fir and cedar timber as there is in the county. It is situated on mostly level ground, thus affording the Company every facility for shipping quantities of good quality timber daily. The road will cost about \$6000 per mile, the greatest expense being in the construction of the bridges to the summit of the mountain. There is but little rock work, mostly sandstone, which is easily removed. The road runs through a coal bank, a paint bank, and a strata of fire proof clay. There also is a large deposit of iron on the top of the mountain. No doubt, in a short time, all these valuable products will go into market. When I look over the country now being developed, after so long being delayed, I am prone to think I was born too soon. However, my children will come in for the profits along with the enterprising men now at work. Allow me to say in this connection that there are no men so valuable to the country, or age in which they live, as those who risk their time and money in the development of the resources of the country, morally, mentally or physically. Robert Rejeski, Who was Charged With the Murder of Thos. Dooley Exonerated. Mention was made in this paper last week of the death of Thos. Dooley, and the discharge of Rejeski from custody on a charge of assault. After the Miss went to press, the coroner's jury concluded its investigations, and returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death from lung congestion and heart failure. It was late Friday afternoon before the coroner's jury completed its work. A charge of murder had been preferred against Rejeski, but when the preliminary hearing came up, the prisoner was discharged in accordance with the verdict of the coroner's jury. There were no witnesses to the fight between Rejeski and Dooley, and the stories of the two men told of the trouble did not corroborate each other. The dying statement of Dooley was that the blows received from Rejeski caused his death, but this was not borne out by the testimony of the physicians. Rejeski contended that Dooley's injuries were caused by a fall, although he acknowledged having struck him with a small stick. The Dooley farm, which the owner
