A NEW ENTERPRISE.
The Oregon Raft Company May Build a Logging Railway up Milton Creek.

If the property owners along the proposed right of way show a liberal spirit, the Oregon Raft Company will transfer its cradles from Stella, Wash., and place them in Scappoose Bay, a short distance above St. Helens. The plan of the company is to build a logging railway to the summit toward Nehalem, and tap the heavily timbered districts on the headwaters of Milton creek. J. W. Shafford, of the company, left town the first of the week to negotiate for the right of way for the proposed logging railway, and it is hoped he will be given the proper encouragement.

While the company are willing to pay a reasonable price for the lands that they may use, they do not want any objections placed in their way. If obstacles are placed in securing the needed right of way, the company may transfer their operations to the vicinity of Holbrook, as there is a desirable body of timber back of that place.

The Oregon Raft Company has carried on the business extensively of rafting logs and poles to San Francisco, and it should be accorded every encouragement to establish themselves in Columbia county.

John Sandstrom vs. Della Sanborn; default and decree of divorce.

Fred A. vs. Jennie M. Wilson; decree on account of desertion and marriage declared null and void, as the plaintiff and defendant were married in the State of Washington a few days after one of the litigants secured a divorce in Oregon.

In the suit of C. Johnson vs. G. B. Johnson, the custody of the minor child was awarded to the defendant.

In the suit of Muckle Bros. vs. Captain James Good, the defendant's demurrer was overruled, and 15 days to answer.
