## PERSONAL

**Death of Francis Marion Tompkins.** F. M. Tompkins, a pioneer of 1852, and a resident of S. A. M. since 1870, died at his home last Thursday and the funeral and burial took place Sunday, January 11th. The funeral was largely attended by a wide circle of friends, and the services were conducted by Rev. Fairchild, of Portland. The deceased was born in Harlan county, Ky., Feb. 12th, 1834. He moved to Alton, Ill., with his parents in 1857, and remained there until 1862, when he crossed the plains. He located at the Dalles, and there married Mary J. Smith, who survives him. The marriage took place June 16 1855. They moved to their present home in 1870. The deceased was 68 years, 10 months and 27 days. Besides the widow, he left seven children as follows: Mrs. L. O. Baxter and Mrs. J. B. Messer, of Portland; John G. Tompkins, of Rainier; Frank S. Tompkins, of McMurry, Wash.; Ella, Nettie and William C. of Scappoose.

Mr. Tompkins was held in the highest esteem by a wide circle of friends.

**Gave Their Initial Performance in S. Helens.** Not many people saw the Blanche Millyard show at the City Hall last Friday evening, and those who did see it are trying to forget it. **District Attorney Allen Files Some Legal Opinions.** District Attorney Allen has filed with the county commissioners an opinion that McGuire, Finlayson and Colwell are entitled to be repaid the money they paid for "old horse" tax sale for certain land that had been sold for taxes assessed before the United States patent issued for the reason that the description of the country's title is an assessment of government land, which assessment is void. Also an opinion on the power of county and city to unite in erecting a building on site for court house owned by the county. He says such tenancy in common, is prohibited by the state constitution. But the county might build and lease to the city. He cites Article XI, Section 9, State Constitution. Also an opinion that the A. & C. R. is bound to pay for improving the public road at Clatsop station within its right of way.—Astoria News.

**FULTON MEN AHEAD.** The Oregon Legislature convened Tuesday, Senator Fulton of Astoria won a victory at the opening of the legislature; both his candidates—Senator Brownell, for president of the senate, and Representative Harris, for speaker of the house—being successful. L. T. Harris of Lane, demoralized the Eddy following and eventually captured its entire strength. The fight for the presidency of the senate was even more interesting than that for the speakership, but B. O'Neill of Clackamas won out on the 18th ballot.

Senator Fulton called the senate to order at 10 a. m. Senator Daly of Benton being chosen president pro-tem and S. L. Morehead, secretary pro-tem.

After the appointment of a committee of credentials, adjournment was taken until 11 o'clock at which hour the report of the committee was presented. Then, on motion of Mr. Fulton, adjournment was taken until 3 p. m.

The senate caucus called to select the president, went to work without delay. For 17 ballots the opposing candidates—Brownell and Dr. A. C. Smith of Multnomah—were tied, each receiving 11 votes. On the 18th ballot a senator whose name cannot be learned changed to Brownell and the deadlock was broken.

S. L. Morehead of Lane, was elected chief clerk of the senate and A. C. Jennings chief clerk of the house.

George E. Chamberlain was inaugurated as governor and Governor Geer retired.

Both houses are flooded with new bills and the state printing office is overcrowded with work.

**Damaged Dogs Must Stay Away.** Stray dogs that come to town hereafter will be amenable to a tax of \$1.00 after their arrival. The old ordinance pertaining to the taxation of dogs has been repealed, for the reason that it is inoperative during the greater part of the year. In the past all the dogs that show up on the first day of April were taxed but during the interval temporary dog residents escaped—that is, a dog could live in St. Helens 264 days, and go off on a visit on April 1st day and escape. The new ordinance provides that dog taxes may be collected at any time, provided that they have not been paid within the current year. All dogs are hereby notified to stay away from the town of St. Helens until further notice. At the meeting of the council Monday night the proposed new ordinance was referred back to the committee for amendment and will come up for final action at a meeting to be held during the later part of the week.

It is now definitely certain that the Muckle sawmill will start up in a day or two. A newly organized company will have charge of the business. It is understood that the new company will be composed of several stockholders of the St. Helens Lumber and Robert Livesay. Other parties also are mentioned as being interested.

The county court has awarded a contract to S. Rock, of Yankton, to build one and one quarter miles of new road near the C. C. Moyer place. It is a change in the Nehalem road, recently ordered. The road is to be corduroy 10 feet wide, and the contract price is \$100. The road will be built on an easy grade, and will be a substantial improvement on a portion of the present main traveled thoroughfare.

Mr. Nordby, of the firm of Olsen & Nordby, lumber and shingle manufacturers at Rainier, Oregon, was in town yesterday looking over the new town of the Washington Red Cedar Shingle Company, and will use it as a model in constructing their second mill. Mr. Nordby also purchased 1,500 cords of bolts from Allen & Co. and Rabins & Sons, of Castle Rock, that were caught at the big boom during the recent flood.—Kelso Journal.

Hon. George Himes, Secretary of the Oregon Historical Society, delivered an interesting lecture before the Reading Circle, last Friday night at the home of Mrs. James Dart. His topic was the early newspapers of Oregon. The Reading Circle appreciated Mr. Himes' lecture very much. The latter spent the following day visiting early pioneers and getting new pointers on former Oregon history.

The sawmill, which was operated under lease to the St. Helens Lumber Company, has been turned over to the owners of the mill, Muckle Bros., by Receiver Quick. E. E. Quick, as receiver, still has charge of the logs and lumber, but his control of the mill only operated under the lease. The conditions of the lease were that in the event the mill was not operated for 30 days, that it would revert to the owners of the property, together with all the improvements added during the term of the lease. Judge McBride made an order a few days ago, to the effect that the mill be turned over to Muckle Bros.
