Death of Robert J. George.

The sudden death of Robert J. George which occurred in a logging camp last Saturday evening, was a sad loss to his parents and many relatives and friends. The funeral took place here at 1 p. m. Tuesday, and was largely attended, many relatives and friends coming from a distance. The services were conducted by Rev. Wilson, of St. Stephens chapel in Houlton. The interment was in the Masonic cemetery, where the services were in charge of the St. Helens Lodge of Masons, of which the deceased was a member. Charles John worshipful master, conducted the impressive services at the grave. Many tastefully decorated floral pieces were in evidence. Robert George was a model young man and held in the highest esteem by a wide circle of friends. He was born at the home of his uncle, Chas. Muckle. The deceased was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob George, and had spent the greater part of his life in St. Helens. His death occurred in a logging camp in an unexpected manner. He had been loading logs along the creek and was returning to his own engine to make some repairs, the crew having left. He climbed up a logway with the intention of jumping on a passing train. He slipped and fell between the logway and train and was struck on the back of the head by one of the cars, crushing the back part of the skull.
