POMONA GRANGE MEETING

A Large Attendance at Clatskanie.

Sixty five Grangers received the Pomona degree at the meeting of the Columbia County Pomona Grange held at Clatskanie, last Saturday. It was the largest quarterly meeting of the Pomona Grange, in the history of its organization. Clatskanie entertained the visiting Grangers in a most hospitable way, nothing being too good for the visitors. They were banqueted, feted, etc., and given the freedom of the town.
