TAX MONEY TO BE RAISED.

Twelve thousand six hundred and seven dollars and forty cents is the additional amount of tax money that will have to be raised in Columbia county this year on account of the increased levies made obligatory for state and school taxes.

It takes at least 12 mills to raise the money needed for county affairs, and avoid going into debt.

This leaves only two ways for the county court to unshackle the levy.

It is not likely that the county court will deviate from the pay-as-you-go plan, and it is a question whether or not the people want the road taxes reduced.
