In the matter of making an allowance towards the support of Mrs. Hilliard. In the matter of the petition of G. E. Wonderly and others for an apportionment of county funds to road district No. 6. In this matter the court decided not to make the appropriation asked for at present. Petition is therefore denied. Adjournd until April 4.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION.—The suit of Muckle Bros. against the Lone Star Lumber Company for possession of the mill property at this place was decided Saturday last by Judge T. A. McBride. The Lone Star Company leased the mill from Muckle Bros., and on July 1st, last, Livesley, the president of the Company, agreed to purchase the same for the sum of \$10,000; but on that date made a tender of the money and found fault with the title. The suit was then brought and defendant filed a cross bill, claiming a defective title and asking for \$15,000 damages for betterments made by them to the property. The decision quiet the title in Muckle Bros., and orders the defendant to pay into Court the purchase price within thirty days, in default of which plaintiffs are awarded \$175 per month rental from July 1st, 1903, Muckle Bros. to give a warranty deed to the property in question. It is generally thought the mill will revert to Muckle Bros., in which case it is believed it will be greatly improved and run to its full capacity, giving employment to a large number of men.

A. F. & A. M.—St. Helens Lodge No. 32, A. F. & A. M., had a very pleasant and profitable session last Saturday night when Dr. Edwin Ross received the mysteries of the entered apprentice degree. After adjournment there was a social session in the hall underneath the lodge room, where coffee, cakes, and sandwiches were partaken of. Among the odd-timers present were Brothers J. H. Swager, T. A. McBride, J. George and Bro. Kennedy. The lodge is having work at nearly every session, and brothers who reside outside of the town are earnestly requested to attend.

ST. HELENS WATERWORKS.—The City Council, at its meeting Tuesday night, ordered a thorough overhauling and repair of the water system of this city, in order that we may have a pure and abundant supply of water during the summer months. A five-inch pipe will be put in from the reservoir to Milton creek; from Milton Creek to the Northwestern Co. Co. Factory, a three-inch pipe; from the factory to the water tank in St. Helens a two-inch pipe. The new tank is to be covered, and sheathed to prevent the sun from shrinking the staves. Councilman Miles was appointed a committee of one to arrange for the purchase of land sufficient to enclose the reservoir with a fence.

DROWNED FROM THE AMERICA.—W. K. Smith, of Portland, was drowned in the Willamette Tuesday afternoon, after rescuing Zoe Brown, daughter of Mrs. L. M. Brown, from a similar fate. The child fell through the railing, and Smith, with true heroism, immediately jumped after her. Just as a boat reached them Mr. Smith lost his hold of the child and sank before they could grasp him. Mrs. Brown is employed as cook on the steamer Albany, and both mother and daughter are well known on the river and by residents of the bordering counties.

JUST IN TIME.—Mr. John Rice, the mail carrier on the Vernonia end of the Nehalem Route, found a man sitting by the wayside in a state of thorough exhaustion, unable to proceed further. He is a resident of the upper Rock Creek country, and was on his way home from Portland where he had been working. Rice aided the man to get to Pittsburg. But for the mail carrier's timely appearance the man would probably have died from exhaustion and cold.

### PROHIBITION CONVENTION.

The First Prohibition Convention of Columbia County met in Houlton March 5th.

It was a large and enthusiastic meeting, nearly 100 being present, besides numbers of messages were received from different parts of the county from supporters with expressions of sympathy for the work, promises of support, etc., both financially and at the polls.

All were badly disappointed in not hearing Oliver W. Stewart, of Chicago. Mr. Stewart was on the train from Salem which was late and so he failed to make connections. All were pleased with the convention work, excepting, of course, some who came with the hopes of getting a handle to a club to hurt the Prohibition ticket. G. L. Tarbell, of Yankton, elected chairman, and Clyde Stewart, of Rainier, secretary of the convention. Committee on credentials: G. R. Hyde, Yankton; T. B. Lott, St. Helens; Wilfred Miller, St. Helens. Committee on platform: G. M. Thorp, Rainier; J. Tompkins, Warren; E. S. Faxon, Yankton. The platform adopted is as follows:

We, the representatives of the Prohibition party, of Columbia County, Ore., in convention assembled, believe the liquor traffic to be morally, politically and financially the greatest evil resting upon our country, and realizing the absolute impossibility of securing the removal of this crime-breeding, poverty-producing, soul-destroying business except through a political party created for and pledged to this end, therefore

Resolved, That while there are many other reforms regarding which we hold firm convictions, we believe it to be the part of wisdom to concentrate our efforts upon this one issue which clearly outweighs all other issues combined. The prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes.

Resolved, That in the accomplishment of this one clearly defined purpose we invite to party fellowship all those who in this one issue agree, in the full belief that the party thus created will be endowed with the wisdom, patriotism, courage and ability to take up and speedily settle all social, financial, economic, industrial, and territorial questions that may arise. Be it further

Resolved, That we endorse and pledge our support to the Local Option measure.

At noon a bountiful lunch of sandwiches, cake, and hot coffee was served by the ladies of the county, which was much enjoyed by all who participated.

The work of nomination was taken up in the afternoon:

W. A. Young, of Clatskanie, was unanimously nominated for Representative; G. L. Tarbell, of Yankton, for Commissioner; Frank Peterson, of Mist, for Assessor; Clyde Stewart, of Rainier, for County Clerk; Dr. J. E. Hall, of Clatskanie, for Coroner; O. W. Allen, of Scappoose, for Treasurer; Lew Davies, of Warren, Sheriff.

A county central committee was elected as follows: G. L. Tarbell, Chairman; Lew Davies, Secretary; Iris W. T. Oliver, Treasurer; T. B. Lott, Clyde Stewart.

Delegates were elected to the State Convention as follows: E. Carpenter, Scappoose; T. B. Lott, St. Helens; Lew Davies, Warren; G. M. Thorp, Rainier; C. W. Jones, Clatskanie; W. O. Ketcham, Houlton; J. Tompkins, Warren; E. E. Chipman, Quincy; W. A. Young, Clatskanie; O. W. Allen, Scappoose.
