So when in June the breezes blew across the prairie West, I packed my grip and told 'em I had got enough, I guesseed!

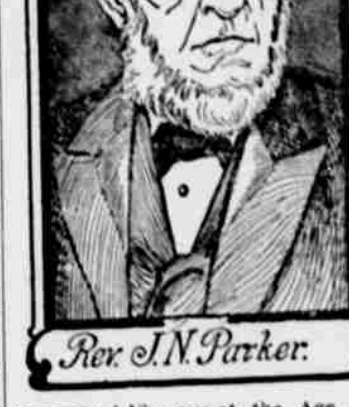
And often now I come out here and set me down a spell. Where rustlin' leaves and warin' grain seem whisp'rin' 'All is well.'
