TIMBER PROTECTION.

An editorial in a recent issue of the Mist appears to have attracted some attention from the papers of the state and to have created a different impression than was intended.

On the contrary, we believe the people of this section favor the utmost protection to timber land, is consistent with the right of the settler to clear his land.

The value of our timber runs into the millions of dollars, and for many years to come it will be our chief source of revenue.

We believe great things are in store for this county in the next few years. New mills are to be started here, new logging roads are to penetrate our forests.

FLAT SALARIES.

The Constitution of this State of Oregon fixes the salaries of State officers, and at the time of the framing of our organic law these salaries were sufficiently high.

HOW FARMERS ARE ROBBED.

The Beef Trust Receives a Decided Setback in the Supreme Court.

Washington, Jan. 30.—The Supreme Court of the United States decided the United States vs. Sweet & Co., known as the beef trust case, charging conspiracy among the packers to fix prices on fresh meats and like products.

In his opinion Justice Holmes discussed at length the various intentions of the packers, and disposed of them individually. He admitted that some of the charges were less specific than desirable, but said this was necessarily true on account of the vast extent of the field covered.

Summarizing the bill, Justice Holmes said: "It charges a combination of a dominant proportion of the dealers in fresh meat throughout the United States not to bid against each other in the livestock markets of the different states, to bid up prices for a few days in order to induce cattlemen to send their stock to the stockyards; to fix prices at which they will sell and to that end to restrict shipments of meat when necessary; to establish a uniform rate of credit to dealers and to keep a blacklist; to make uniform and improper charges for cartage, and finally, to get less than lawful rates from the railroads to the exclusion of competitors."

FOR A STATE CHARTER.

Provisions of the Bill for a Constitutional Convention.

The substitute bill for a constitutional convention, reported favorably by the Judiciary Committee of the State Senate, provides that the constitutional convention be held at Salem, January 8, and that it shall contain 90 members, 30 from the State at large, chosen by the Supreme Court, and 60 by the electors of the State.
