The damage was considerable and will be repaired immediately.

Mr. Ole Olsen, who runs a sawmill at Deer Island, is interested in the construction of roads in that district and offers the county court to put down road plank at any place desired on the contemplated road at \$6 per thousand.

There will be a new street lamp placed at the corner of Columbia and Tualatin streets, to accommodate the residents in that portion of our city.

Mr. James Darts was a Portland visitor by the trains on Tuesday last.

Landlord Cloninger has had a neat sign suspended at the east entrance to the porch of the St. Helens Hotel.

The Northern Pacific has purchased the Columbia River and Northern. This fact may be of considerable local interest in time to come, as it may mean the abandonment of the ferry across the Columbia River at St. Helens. The sale includes the river steamboats Regulator, Gazert, Dallas City, and Metlaco, the consideration being \$1,000,000.

We are in receipt of a box of potatoes from Mr. I. T. Wilson, of Bunker Hill. In a note Mr. Wilson states they were grown on mountain land, without irrigation or fancy cultivation. The tops were twice frozen to the ground. They are certainly creditable spots and demonstrate that Columbia County soil is good, from the river level to the mountain tops. They have been forwarded to the cold storage in Portland for Columbia County's exhibit.

When Mr. Graham, of Perry & Graham, the Houlton merchants, visited the county seat last Thursday, having a load to return with, he left his wagon seat on Sheldon's dock, but when Mr. Perry came after it on Saturday it had disappeared. If it was stolen, Mr. Perry wants the thief to understand that he is known, but if it is his first offense and he will return it, there will be no questions asked. It can be placed on the front porch of the store at Houlton, any time of the day or night, and will be thankfully received.

Mrs. C. I. Hooghkirk, of Rainier, district deputy for the Rathbone Sisters, was in St. Helens last Thursday afternoon in the interest of the forthcoming district convention to be held in Astoria. She was entertained at an informal luncheon by the local Sisters.

County Assessor Laws intended to begin the fieldwork of assessing this county Monday last, but has been compelled to postpone it until April, and possibly later. The new law requires that a census shall be taken this year, and the assessor recently wrote to the Secretary of State, asking for information in regard to the census blanks. The Secretary in answering states that the State will furnish these blanks to the counties and forwards a sample of the blank that will be used in making the enrollment of the inhabitants and the military enrollments. This blank is a very comprehensive one and it will take a great deal of work to secure the information it calls for; but the second blank, which provides for an enumeration of the industrial products, is by far the hardest to comply with, as it contains a column for each agricultural product. The law provides that the county shall pay the additional expense incurred, and this will be no small item, as the blanks contain about seventy-five columns that must be filled by the assessor and his deputies. It will probably take four months' time for the officers to take the census and assessment.

There will be no butter test at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, but \$40,000 in premiums, and possibly more, will be distributed among those exhibiting stock. Columbia County has the three best dairy herds in the State and the county exhibit will get credit for them in making up the points. With our dairy stock, fish, minerals, timber and agricultural products, there is no reason why we should not secure one of the prizes offered by the Exposition Commission. Let each man and woman do his and her share. The Grange is pledged to do its best, and that spells success.

Mr. Harry West is still in the North Pacific Sanatorium at Portland, where he has been for about seven weeks. During that time he has had three operations performed and has suffered a great deal. His trouble now is confined to his right foot, but it is thought he will soon recover. Quite a number of his Columbia County friends have visited him, and he will be glad to see others who may come, as time hangs heavily in an institution of that kind upon a man who is used to an active outdoor life. He is anxious to get back home and begin the work of putting his famous herd of Jerseys in shape for the great stock show at the Lewis and Clark Centennial.
