Clyde Eric, of Houlton, received severe injuries to his right hand one day this week, by catching it in the machinery at the Western Co. Paper Company's factory. The physician in attendance believes he will be able to save the entire hand, though it was terribly mangled. Wm. Kettle, who was injured at the factory, a short time since, will soon be able to resume work.

Fully two thirds of the taxes of Columbia County have been collected up to the present date. Monday is the last day of grace, after which there will be ten per cent penalty and a twelve per cent interest. Receipts will be mailed just as rapidly as possible, and no one will be overlooked. The sheriff's office has been open late every night, and it should be remembered that this is without extra compensation and not a part of the officers duty, but they want to see the work done.

Sheriff White went to Kalama on Monday last and returned with Preston H. Fifer, better known as "Bud." Fifer had been living in Chris Gore's house at Goble and had been disturbing the neighborhood by the indiscriminate use of firearms while suffering from the effects of the immoderate use of liquor. He would fire his weapon out of the house for a while and then go outside and open a regular Japanese inn on his own residence. In his mania he claimed to be firing at people who were persecuting him, but in fact they were creatures of his imagination. Sheriff White went for him Sunday, but was unable to find him, as he had made his escape to a small island near town, where he remained four or five days without food, as no one lives on the island. He then hailed two Leroy boys who were fishing in a small boat, and they conveyed him to Kalama. Over a week ago Fifer slipped on a plank walk and broke his collarbone and this had received no attention and was not set until his arrival at Kalama. He will be held here for a few days to await developments as to his mental condition.

Muckle Brothers' dam on Milton Creek began leaking last Monday night, and in order to save it from serious damage the water was let out. This in turn, broke the wood dam of the Oregon Wood Company, running out a large quantity of wood which was caught at the mouth of the creek.
