COUNTY COURT.

Proceedings of the County Court Adjourned March Term, 1905.

Saturday April 1st, 1905, 5th day. In the matter of opening and considering sealed bids for improvements to county roads in districts laying a special tax:

Bids for improvement of county roads in district No. 13 as follows to-wit: Wm. Rose \$2750.00, Graham & Kent \$2250.00 and W.C. Cooper \$1700.00 now considered by the court, and same are rejected as being too high; for improvement of roads in road district No. 4, no bids were submitted.

It is therefore ordered by the court, that the road supervisors of said districts Nos. 4 and 13 proceed to work out special road tax of said districts, in the manner contemplated by the tax payers of said districts as set forth in their resolutions, under the supervision of this court.

In the matter of appointing a road supervisor in road district No. 10: O. E. Elliot, the present supervisor, having resigned, James Van is now appointed to said office by the court, and it is ordered that he qualify according to law.

ROAD LAW.

See page 271, section 28, of 1903 session road laws: The supervisor shall open, or cause to be opened, with any funds in his hands available for that purpose, all public roads which may have been or may hereafter be laid out and established according to law in any part of this road district, and shall keep the same in good repair, and shall have authority to enter upon any lands adjoining or near by the county road and gather, dig, and carry away any stone, gravel, or sand, and cut down and carry off any tree or wood necessary for the making or repairing of any public road, and to purchase and pay for any timber, plank, or other materials necessary for making or repairing any public road in his district.

Sec. 29. If any person shall feel aggrieved by the act of the supervisor cutting or carrying away material, as aforesaid, he may make complaint thereof in writing, to the county court, at any regular meeting within six months after the cause of such complaint accrues, and such court shall proceed to assess and determine the damages, if any, sustained by the complainant, the cost of the same to be paid out of the county treasury.

The above, while a new law, is in keeping with the spirit of the old law. See Hill's Code, secs. 4062 and 4063. For supreme court decisions along this line see Kendall v. Post, 8 Or. 141; also Cherry v. Mathews, 25 Or. 484, and Branson v. Gee, 25 Or. 492.

Joint districts. In these districts the number of children in Columbia County only is given. Bonus is the balance of the \$20 apportioned each district annually regardless of the number of children in the district. This \$20 should be distributed in October of each year, but cannot be taken from the State fund. Therefore County funds last October sufficient to give each district only \$17.75 of the \$20 due, hence the balance (\$2.25) is made up in this spring's apportionment.
