Mrs. Elizabeth M. Rubert died in St. Helens on Monday last, her funeral services taking place Wednesday, April 5, at the Congregational Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Taggart, the burial taking place at the Odd Fellows cemetery at Warren. Mrs. Rubert was born in Dresden, Maine, November 23, 1832, and was married to Andrew J.
