The Steel Trust and Columbia County.

In the Evening Telegram of the 17th there appeared the following article: "Communications which have passed between the Chamber of Commerce and the American Steel Co., of Pittsburg, Pa., have resulted in the latter corporation practically promising, through its secretary, W. B. Kelly, to send a representative to Portland in August for the purpose of looking over the sites available on which to erect a steel plant.

The inauguration of such a project as is here outlined cannot fail to greatly affect the interests of this county. We have the iron, of good quality and practically unlimited in quantity. We also have the coal, and in our mine is found a good flux. We also have the sites on the Columbia river that could be obtained without cost.

PORTLAND FAIR DRAWS WELL.

Usually an exposition is disappointed during its early days by reason of attendance falling far below expectations, but this is not the case with the Lewis and Clark Exposition. During the first week the admissions were 99,275. These included the remarkably large attendance of 39,577 on opening day.

The Portland Fair will run 137 days, or until October 15. Expert guessers, before the opening, figured that the total attendance would be from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000. Even if the daily average does not exceed that of the first week, the attendance will be but a little short of a million and a half—the highest figure set by the guessers.

But as the Exposition progresses the crowds are sure to increase. This is the history of all expositions. Every day there is some special event, and during the season there are a number of such events will more than double the ordinary attendance. The exhibition management is highly gratified at the auspicious start already made.

A splendid building has been erected for entertainment purposes at the Exposition by the Masonic order. The structure is located on Lewis and Clark boulevard and faces the Oriental exhibit palace and the Forestry building. The Masonic building is finished with green barlup walls, Flemish oak wainscot and handsome carpets of a pleasing shade of green.

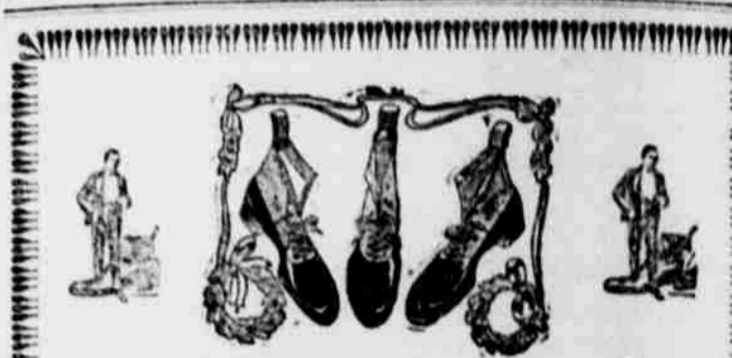
