AID FOR THE NEHALEM.

The attack upon the County Court because it has appropriated money from the general fund to aid in the building of a decent grade for the road connecting Clatskanie and the Nehalem Valley, comes with peculiarly bad grace from a paper published in the south end of Columbia County.

All the roads cannot be given the attention they need in any one year, and there was no section of the county that stood in greater need of assistance or better deserved it.

The County Judge did not "sit idly by," as the Register charges, while this aid was being given to the people of the lower end of the county.

As to the formation of a taxpayer's league, we are inclined to favor the idea, but it should be composed of those who pay taxes in their own name and work out their three dollar road tax.

Proceedings of the County Court September 1905 Term

September 6th, 1st Judicial day. In the matter of the petition of Felix Debast et al, for the location of a county road.

Ordered that warrant issue in full payment of above contract in the sum of \$199.00 favor of Gust Gustafson, and that warrant for \$199.75 drawn upon the special road fund of said R. D. No. 15 at July term of this court, in favor of D. W. Keasey be cancelled.

Adjournd till 7th, inst. September 7th, 1905, 2nd Judicial day. In the matter of the petition of P. J. Smith et al for the location of a county road. Ordered that viewers meet at point of beginning of proposed road on September 25th, 1905 at 10 a. m. and view, survey and report on same.

In the matter of the petition of Felix Debast et al for the location of a county road. Second reading of the viewers report now had, and claims for damages of C. C. and Annie Wilson now considered by the court; and it is ordered by the court that the viewers report on this road be, and same is hereby accepted, except in the matter of damage to premises of C. C. Wilson, which amount is hereby increased to \$25.00, and further ordered that said road be opened to public travel, and recorded as a County road.

county warrants over 7 years old on July 1st, 1905. The following named warrants being all the spinty warrants remaining in the hands of the county clerk that were drawn more than 7 years prior to the 1st day of July 1905, were now ordered cancelled in the presence of the court.

In the matter of the payment of salary of the secretary of the county Board of Health. Ordered that Secretary of the county Board of Health be paid at rate 1 and 3/4 cents each on population of \$440 in 4 quarterly payments as provided by law.

In the matter of proposed change in route of county road at Near City. It appearing to the court that the owners of the land required to make proposed change are ready to deed same to the county, an l that said change will benefit the road, it is therefore ordered that when said deed is filed for record, said new route be accepted as the county road.

Adjournd to 8th, inst. September 8th, 1905, 3rd Judicial day. All the bills against the county, road districts and special funds reported last week, were on this day allowed by the court, and the clerk ordered to issue warrants in payment of same.

Adjournd to 9th, inst. September 9th, 1905, 4th Judicial day. In the matter of procuring the books etc. required for the registration of land titles. Ordered that county clerk take advice as to what books etc. are necessary, and procure same at once.

In the matter of the publication of the delinquent tax list of 1904. Ordered that county papers be notified to submit bids to this court for the publication of same according to law, on or before Sept. 30th, 1905.

In the matter of the complaint of Supervisor of R. D. No. 9 regarding blocking of the county road at Inglis, by the Oregon Lumber Co. Ordered that said company be and they are hereby notified, to leave at least 20 ft in width clear on said road, and conduct their stumping operations in such manner hereafter, that water from same shall not run into county road.

Adjournd to September 30th, 1905.
