JUST LIKE THE GRANGE.

Do you want to behold a spectacle of true equality between men and women? Attend if you can get the privilege—a meeting of a labor union in which men and women are affiliated. There are many such. The cigar makers, the overalls makers, the hat and cap makers, the glove makers, often have their local organizations together. Every man is addressed as brother, and every woman as sister, not in the old-fashioned, sentimental, religious sense, where the men were full brothers and the sisters half sisters, but in the fullest significance of the term. There is one picture in my mind which I can call up vividly at will and always with a certain emotion. There was a strike of paper box makers on the East Side. The strikers were mere children, the youngest fourteen and the oldest not much over eighteen. They were striking against an outrageous cut in wages, and they had many grievances besides. The "bosses" were men with political influence and the young agitators had suffered rather sadly at the hands of the police. They used to meet every afternoon in a shabby little hall far over in the tangle of streets in the eastern tenement district. I knew some of them and was allowed to drop in on my way home from work. One night when I went in it was snowing and the wind was bitterly cold. The meeting was about to adjourn and the chairman was called upon to appoint pickets to patrol the streets in front of the factory. "I'll appoint the littlest girls," he said. "The cops won't be so apt to bother them. They can't accuse them of violence. I'll call for volunteers." Immediately all the littlest girls sprang to their feet with hands raised. Some of them were no larger than a ten year old child who has had a chance to grow normally. Few of them had hats and not one wore really warm clothes. Yet they went gladly into the snowy night to do their duty by the others. "Good night brothers and sisters," they called out in Yiddish as they clattered down the stairs.—Exchange.

LET US SPRAY.

The County Court should by all means appoint a fruit inspector whose duty it would be to see that the pest infected orchards of Columbia County are properly sprayed and otherwise cared for, in order that they may cease to be a menace to the interests of those who have the intelligence and industry to raise good fruit. Fruit raising in this county is going to be one of our great industries. One year's crop from an acre of choice apples, properly packed, is worth more than seven times the top prices per acre yet paid for a tract of timber land, and it is probable that within thirty years from now the apple crop of this county will be more important than the output of its mills, give employment to more labor and yield greater returns.

We have demonstrated our ability to compete with and excel Hood River in the production of certain varieties of apples, and all that is necessary to insure the favorable attention of Eastern buyers is that a greater acreage shall be planted, so as to make our output worthy of consideration by the shippers. In order that this may be more speedily brought about it is necessary that the careless and indifferent growers, who are unwilling to go to a little expense and trouble to put up a fight against the pests be compelled to do their duty, and the only way to procure this result is for the County Court to place the matter in the charge of a competent and fearless man who will not hesitate to do his duty.

VERNONIA ITEMS.

Judson Weed, who went out to Philomath to spend the holidays with his family, returned to his ranch up the river Sunday.

T. R. Throop has bought the engine and chopper which Arthur Johnson has been running the past year, and is moving them to town and expects to run them for the benefit of the farmers and dairymen of the valley who want their grain made into "chop" before feeding to stock. Tom will set them up under the old Zilligitt lumber shed, just northwest of Pringle's store.

Mrs. Arthur Johnson has been quite sick since Sunday morning. Among other things are indisposed are Jonathan Truett, J. C. Coulter and Mrs. W. H. Palmer. The latter has been bedfast for more than a month, but is not considered in a serious condition. Mrs. C. V. Palmer has also been laid up for a week or two with rheumatism, but is able to be out again. Clarence has been getting some experience in housekeeping.

We have had word the past week from our old friend and former citizen of the Nehalem, John Edholm, who since last spring, with his family, has been living at Scappoose, that he has sold out his interest in the logging and milling business to Eastern parties and that he is now ready for something else, should anything right nice and with big inducements ahead turn up. We prophesy that he and family will become residents of the old homestead west of town next spring or summer. John wants to know if the surveyors for the new railroad have struck Vernonia yet. No, John; and the prospect in that direction is growing discouragingly less all the time.

The death of two of our citizens during the past week—S. D. Sheeley and Wm. Wilson—occurring within three days, being near neighbors and among the early settlers of the Nehalem, has created a profound impression upon the whole community. Mr. Sheeley had not been well for several years, his declining health following a severe attack of typhoid fever in October, 1903, contracted while out in the hopfields of Yamhill County. His last sickness began about six weeks ago, and the immediate cause of his death, which occurred on the 11th, was abscess of the liver. Mr. Wilson's sickness was caused by his getting thoroughly wet and chilled in the cold rain wet before last, which resulted in a violent attack of inflammatory rheumatism. For a few days he seemed to improve, but he suffered a relapse, the disease extending to the chest, spinal cord and brain. He grew rapidly worse and passed away on the evening of the 13th. Mr. Sheeley's funeral services were held at the church in Vernonia on Friday, and Mr. Wilson's on Monday last, Rev. J. O. Coleman preaching appropriate sermons. The bodies were laid to rest in the cemetery near town. The entire community sympathizes with their bereaved families. Obituary notices will appear in the Mist next week.
