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OF INTEREST TO TAXPAYERS.

Every assessor shall require any person liable to be taxed in his county to furnish him a list of his real estate situated in his county liable to taxation, and a list of all his personal property liable to taxation in this State, and shall require such person to make oath that to the best of his knowledge and belief such list contains a full and true account of all his property liable to be taxed in such county; and if any person shall refuse to furnish such list, or to swear to the same when required so to do by the assessor, such person shall forfeit and pay to the assessor, for the use of the county, the sum of Twenty Dollars, which sum may be recovered by motion in any court having jurisdiction of matters of debt or contract to the amount of Twenty Dollars.—Extract from Codes and Statutes of Oregon.

The verified list provided for by this section is not an assessment of the property, nor is the assessor bound by it. It is only an aid to the assessor in arriving at the true value and amount of property to be assessed to a person.

As the time for making the assessment and completing the roll, and the assistance, is limited, it becomes very necessary that as much time as possible be saved; and as it has been the experience of assessors that much time may be saved by furnishing property owners with necessary blanks that may be made up and returned to the assessor; and where this plan has been adopted it has been found very satisfactory to both taxpayer and assessor. In following this plan the assessor has decided to go to each of the different postoffices in the county and remain at each place only a few days, and if anyone has any particular business they wish to attend to in person they will have the opportunity to do so; if not, they may fill out their blank and return it to his office; after the blank has been received at the office the assessment will be made and a statement mailed to the property owner. On account of much trouble arising from making the assessment of property where deeds have not been recorded, the assessor has decided to follow the law and assess property to owner as shown on record at first of March.

As the time for making the assessment and completing the roll, and the assistance, is limited, it becomes very necessary that as much time as possible be saved; and as it has been the experience of assessors that much time may be saved by furnishing property owners with necessary blanks that may be made up and returned to the assessor; and where this plan has been adopted it has been found very satisfactory to both taxpayer and assessor.

In following this plan the assessor has decided to go to each of the different postoffices in the county and remain at each place only a few days, and if anyone has any particular business they wish to attend to in person they will have the opportunity to do so; if not, they may fill out their blank and return it to his office; after the blank has been received at the office the assessment will be made and a statement mailed to the property owner.
