COMMUNICATION.

RAINIER, OR., MAY 22, 1906.

Whereas, in view of the unfavorable advertising that Rainier has been receiving in the daily papers of Portland recently, and in order to set the matter right before the general public, be it

Resolved, That we, the undersigned citizens, business men and property owners of the town of Rainier, deprecate the controversy now being waged in the newspapers, especially the Oregonian, concerning the people of the town, exaggerating every instance of technical violation of the law, mistaking and perverting of facts to suit their own ends and representing the town as a den of vice and iniquity, when in fact it is as law abiding and orderly as there is in the State of Oregon. The bitter war now being waged between the saloon and anti-saloon elements to further their own personal and political ends, the way-laying and beating of Mr. Fischer we condemn in the strongest terms, neither do we condone nor approve of writing of falsehoods and mis-statements for publication. Rainier, of course, is no paradise, neither is it the hell-hole which some have painted it to be by their distorted statements that have been published. The state of affairs spoken of by the grand jury does not exist here, and we, as citizens, protest against such unjust criticism, and believe that had the business men and property owners been cognizant of such proceedings, and had been given an opportunity to refute them, the report would have been entirely different, had any been made on the subject; and further be it

Resolved, That we consider the city council fully competent to manage the affairs of the town; that the city marshal is an efficient officer and is doing his duty; that the statement that the saloons are run wide open on Sunday are absolutely false and without foundation.

THE COUNTY TICKET.

Is there any reason that can be given why a single democratic nominee for a County office should be elected in Columbia County this year? Every man on the Republican ticket was nominated in an open primary election, where each voter had an equal chance to express his preference, and, if we did not all get just what we wanted that constitutes no good reason why we should discredit the direct primary law by balking at the result.

As a matter of fact, however, the ticket is one, from representative to coroner, that commends itself to the best judgment of the community and is worthy of support even if politics is left entirely out of the question. This is recognized by our opponents when they refuse to put up a square democratic fight all along the line and resort to the guerrilla tactics of attempting to "swipe" off an office here and there. The Mist proposes to make a brief review of the ticket, in order that those who may not be well acquainted with the candidates may understand just what the Republican party offers to the voters:

FOR REPRESENTATIVE.

Mr. Elmer Connell, the Republican nominee for representative, is a native son of Oregon, and a young man of excellent ability. He is a graduate of Amherst college, and in the Legislature will be an earnest and intelligent worker for Columbia county's interests. By occupation Mr. Connell is a farmer, and has the management and control of one of the largest farms in Columbia county. His sympathies should and doubtless will be with the agricultural classes, and he may be relied upon to stand for whatever is best for their interests. He is also a shrewd business man and no one will be able to use him as a tool for their designs. He will come as near knowing what he is doing as any man at Salem, and he will not plead ignorance as a justification for any vote he may cast. Mr. Connell is but twenty-six years of age; he is ambitious, and he knows full well that his only hope of future success is in the approval of the voters, therefore he is very sure to do his utmost to satisfy their wishes. He has made no pledges whatever except those included in his primary platform, and there is no good reason why he should not receive the vote of every Republican in Columbia County. We trust his majority will be just the same as that of the Republican nominee for Governor, and that his record will justify the people in re-nominating and re-electing him two years from now.

FOR SHERIFF.

Martin White is so well known to the voters and his administration of his office has been so satisfactory that no one is attempting to dispute the election with him. He has made a good and economical tax collector, and has shown on numerous occasions that he possesses the necessary nerve to arrest desperate criminals. No county in Oregon has a better sheriff than Martin White or a more efficient deputy than C. W. Blaksgley. They are a good team and the people are going to hire them over again.

FOR COUNTY CLERK.

Mr. W. A. Harris represents competency and industry. Not a word will be heard against his ability to conduct the office. At the time of the direct primaries Mr. Harris was in the East, and in his absence, without any effort upon his part, the Republican voters chose him for their nominee over a most worthy competitor. So far as Republican voters are concerned, especially those who took part in the primary election, they are in honor bound to give Mr. Harris their full support at the polls on Tuesday next.

FOR COMMISSIONER.

Harry West, of Scappoose, will be the next county commissioner, and he will make just as good a one as that other Scappoose, Phil Frakes. He will not be swayed by every person who approaches him, but he will give careful consideration to every detail of the business and favor an economical but progressive administration of the county's finances.

FOR TREASURER.

Dr. Edwin Ross takes it because no one else seemed to want it. He waited quite a while before announcing his candidacy for renomination, but everybody seemed satisfied that the money was safe in his hands, so he will serve for another two years by general consent.

FOR CORONER.

One of the gravest undertakings in the county is the office of coroner. No other has such a serious and solemn aspect. It is certainly one office in which partisan politics plays no part, and therefore it has become a time honored custom to give it to the hottest politician in the county, Dr. Harry R. Cliff, of St. Helens.

Look your ticket over and you will find that it is an excellent one. You helped nominate it, and we hope you will not fail to do your duty to help elect it.
