John Pringle is closing up a deal wherein the Sage Land and Improvement Co., of Albany, N. The deal involves a consideration of about \$285,000, and is the largest ever made of lands in this part of the country. The lands lie around Vernonia, north, east, and south, from Oak Ranch creek to Wolfe creek.

The railroad situation is getting to be rather dubious as to the down the river route, which is the one our people are interested in most. We fear that we have let the golden opportunity of securing a railroad to Vernonia slip out of our grasp. While we have been busy with other things and letting the subscription drag along and the contract guaranteeing the road the free right-of-way, the people of Tillamook county have been up and doing. They are not only offering the road the free right-of-way but a bonus beside. Not only this but the engineering corps of the road have been pushing the survey on the Salmonberry route to Tillamook, and report that they find an easy grade and have located the road to the summit. Our people who have been saying that we are going to get the road anyway, are going to wake up some fine morning, find that the construction force are at work on the line going west from the 20-mile station instead of on the line down the river. We make these statements after a careful investigation of facts. Now what are we to do in the matter? Some of the committee are getting a hustle on themselves. Let our people respond right liberally and get the subscription up to the required amount. Let the contract then be signed and presented to the company guaranteeing the right-of-way. This will be fulfilling our part of the obligation. Then if the road does not come the blame will not rest with us.

Portland does not like the idea of losing the greater portion of its grain trade, but its business men know that is just what will happen if Jim Hill builds to Frankfort on the lower Columbia. Hill is not a man who booms or blows, and his recent purchase of a tract at Frankfort seems to be conclusive proof that he has made up his mind to build to that place, and there will soon be a big boom on.
