## COLUMBIA COUNTY CATTLE.

Mr. P. A. Frakes, of Scappoose, Columbia County, Oregon, with the emphasis on the word Oregon, exhibited his Holstein cattle at the Interstate Fair, recently held at Yakama, Washington, and we herewith append the result as given by the Spokesman Review:

In the Holstein class, P. A. Frakes' Sir Methill Jewel was first and Hazelwood farm's Sir Ormsby Dekol second. In the class for junior yearling bulls, Hazelwood farm won without competition. In the bull calf class Frakes' and Hazelwood each had two entries, one of dairy type and one for beef. Frakes' Sir Lundek Dekol won the blue ribbon, Hazelwood farm getting second and third. In the class for aged cows Frakes' Chloe Methille was first and his Injuk-Dekol second, and Hazelwood got third. The Frakes heifers were the first prize winners in the Holstein class, with Hazelwood second. In the junior yearling heifers, Hazelwood got first and third and Frakes second. In aged heifers Hazelwood was second and Frakes first. In young heifers this was reversed. For the best sire in each class, Frakes was first and Hazelwood second. For produce of cow, Frakes got first. For champion bull, 2 years old or over, Frakes got first and Hazelwood farm second. The award for champion aged cow went to Frakes. For champion heifer under 2 years, Frakes got first and the reserve champion award went to Hazelwood farm. The first for grand champion on both bull and cow went to Frakes.

We notice that the Washington paper makes no mention of the fact that the cattle achieving this great victory came from Oregon; but probably that was an oversight as the Washington papers are always keen to give full credit to the products of their sister state. We suggest to Mr. Frakes, however, that hereafter he have his stalls placarded "Columbia County, Oregon," in order that his home county may receive credit for his good work.

## HEARST AND HIS PLATFORM.

The nomination of W. R. Hearst for Governor of the Empire State by the Independence League and by the Democratic State Convention insures one of the most interesting campaigns ever witnessed in New York. The Republicans have pitted against him Mr. Hughes, who made himself conspicuous by his exposure of the insurance scandals. He is probably the strongest man they could have selected, and it is generally believed that his nomination was forced by President Roosevelt, in opposition to the other Republican bosses—for it must be admitted that the President is something of a boss himself.

But Mr. Hughes is not going to have very smooth sailing, and it is altogether possible that he may be defeated. Hearst is phenomenally strong with the working people, to whom he has always been a firm friend. He is independent and fearless, and has plenty of money to carry on his campaign. His platform, announced before he received either nomination, and to which he still adheres is worthy of close study, and is as follows:

I am a Jefferson Democrat, and that, as I understand it is practically the same as a Lincoln Republican, for the Republican party was formed to restore the action of the Government to the principles of Washington and Jefferson.

I believe in the impartial enforcement of the laws as they exist.

I believe in public ownership of public utilities.

But the first qualification for public ownership is honesty in office and independence in voting.

I believe that the protective principle is valuable in itself but has been unreasonably extended and outrageously abused.

I believe in protection for infant industries. I believe in protection for American labor. I believe the tariff should be modified and public ownership inaugurated, but that should be done cautiously and conservatively, with due regard to the stability of business interests and the perpetuation on which we all depend.

I believe in the restraint and regulation of trusts and monopolies by law.

I believe in labor unions and farmers' granges and organizations that promote the distribution of wealth, and I realize that the prosperity of legitimate business men depends upon the purchasing power of the masses.

I believe in every measure that gives the people more direct control of the Government.

I believe in direct nominations and open primaries.

I believe in purity in politics.

I will run in this campaign, not merely representing the Independence League, but merely the Democratic party, but I hope, the people of the State of New York. I appeal to them and make my pledge to them to retain for them the rights they still have and to restore to them the liberties they have lost.

It seems to us that this will meet the approval of the people. His utterance on the tariff question is especially clean and commendable, and embodies the belief of vast numbers of Republicans.

## WHO WILL BE BENEFITED.

Ramsay Park Grange, located at Dufur, Wasco County, Oregon, has adopted a resolution calling upon the Legislature to provide for the employment of convicts at making grain sacks, and asking that these sacks be sold to the farmers at cost. At present the convicts are leased to the firm of Goldsmith & Loewenberg who employ them in their penitentiary stove factory, paying the State about 35 cents per day, which is about one sixth of what free labor can be had for. These convict-made stoves compete with those made by free labor and prevent the establishment of a stove factory in this State.

Their employment in the manufacture of grain sacks would be of benefit to a large number of persons, but still it is not clear that the wheat growers of Eastern Oregon and the Willamette Valley are entitled to have their grain sacks furnished them at cost by the State or that this is the best way to employ the convicts. Why not put them to work upon the roads, letting each county, if it so desires, have as many of them as may be deemed best, under such regulations as will secure their humane treatment and prevent their escape. The men who would be the most benefited by grain sacks at cost are the very ones who least need any such assistance from the State—the owners of the vast wheat ranches of Eastern Oregon.
