GOOD WORK.

The action of the people of road district No. 3, in voting a special levy of 6 mills, and designating the manner in which the money shall be expended was wise and timely. It indicates that the people of St. Helens and Houlton, and the surrounding territory of this district realize that no good can be accomplished without expense and effort, and that they are determined the roads of this district shall be put in first-class condition at as early a date as possible. There should be a road from St. Helens to Portland that would tempt automobiles to make this place an adjective point for their pleasure trips. It possesses inducements that a trip up the valley cannot offer, and we have a hotel here that is not equaled in any other community of this size in the State. We believe it would pay well to advertise these facts next spring in Portland's daily papers, and that the result would be to draw attention to the fact that there is no section of Oregon that offers so many advantages to those who desire beautiful country homes within easy reach of the metropolis. With a modern electric road St. Helens is within a half hour's travel of Portland, and it is certain, with the rapid growth of the city, that such a road will be constructed within a very few years. The construction of first class county roads will do much toward hastening the advent of the electric road, and we hope the two other districts line will join with us in pushing the good work along.

Development of the lumber business is nowhere more noticeable than at the numerous river ports below Portland. At St. Johns, St. Helens, Rainier, Kalama, Linnton, Stella, Knappaon and Astoria are seagoing vessels loading lumber cargoes, while at most of the ports mentioned a rail lumber trade is also handled. The lumber industry, from the time the logger fells the tree until the finished product is stowed aboard the vessel, is continually disbursing money for labor, and it is on this money that the prosperity of a great many new towns and cities in the Pacific Northwest is largely dependent. The capacity of the lumber fleet loading on the Columbia and Willamette Rivers is seldom less than 20,000,000 feet, and it not infrequently reaches 30,000,000 feet. Even in its present proportions, it is far short of the maximum which will be reached many years hence.—Oregonian.

Postage stamps of the issue of 1907 at 6,000 presidential postoffices, will bear on their face the name of the state and the city in which the postoffice is situated. The chief reason for this is said to be the belief that it will help to do away with postoffice robberies and make it much easier to trace criminals. The postoffice robbery at Chicago a few years ago is a good example of the ease with which stolen postage stamps can be disposed of, for no trace of the perpetrators was ever discovered, although nearly \$100,000 worth of stamps were stolen and these mostly in small denominations. Another reason for the change is to enable the postoffice department to determine the amount of business done by different postoffices and prevent padding through stamps sold by some offices to residents who do business in adjoining cities.

The Oregon Development League, through its central office at Portland, issues a statement to the effect that its present interest in Oregon is unprecedented in the history of the state and exceeds by one hundred per cent that of the Lewis and Clark Exposition period. That the larger part of enquiries come from the middle west. A very large proportion of them relate to dairying. All local development leagues should keep in touch with the State League.

The president is all right when he speaks of the Japanese as a great people at home, but when he advocates naturalizing them he oversteps the mark a little, and he may learn so to his sorrow. As students they may be well enough, but as laborers they are more of a menace, particularly on this coast, than the Chinese ever were, and should be excluded just as rigorously, if not more so. They will work for less wages and live cheaper than Chinamen, and their interest in this country is limited to what they can make out of it.

The coal famine is causing both distress and death in many parts of the Union and Hill and Harriman fight merrily on, being blinded to the needs of their patrons by the intensity of their strife in seeking personal gain.

There was a little flurry in the Wall street money market this week and the lambs were fleeced as usual.

The Admiral of the Japanese fleet, visiting the Hawaiian Islands, states that the fleet will not visit San Francisco because he fears a repetition of the Maine incident. The little brown man evidently has a very poor opinion of Americans.

RAINIER

Rainier Knights of Pythias gave an oyster supper and entertainment last Saturday evening to their sister order, now known as the Pythian Sisters, (heretofore the Rathbones) in honor of the full recognition of the latter order by the Supreme Lodge, Knights of Pythias. The program consisted of speeches of congratulation, vocal and instrumental music and served to pass away a very pleasant evening. Those of the Knights who failed to attend neglected a good opportunity.

The pie social and bazaar given by the Ladies Aid Society, of the M. E. church at the K. P. hall last Friday evening, was quite largely attended and was a very decided financial success, realizing considerable more than the ladies anticipated.

The Portland Lumber Co. has purchased the steamer Excelsior and will remodel her into a cargo-carrier, capable of taking 800,000 feet of lumber. The tendency is evidently for the great lumber producers to own their own vessels, so that they may be to an extent, independent.

The new Iraida will take her place upon the route in a few days. Her machinery is all in, and all that remains to be done is the furnishings and painting. She will be a comfortable boat to travel on, and, as the steamboat is the greatest of anti-monopolists, she should receive a goodly share of the patronage of our citizens.

Marshal Zwemer requests that any one who knows of parties begging or in any way making themselves offensive to residents notify him of the fact and he will attend to the matter.

Mr. B. W. Reed, of the Rainier Mill & Lumber Co., went to Portland Friday on a business trip which extended over several days, and to meet Mr. W. I. Reed, president of the company, who returned after spending several months looking after the California end of the business.

Rev. H. G. Kemp, who has been pastor of the M. E. church at this place for about fifteen months, resigned his pa-

torate last Sunday morning and preached his farewell sermon in the evening. The cause assigned for his resignation was a disagreement with the presiding elder in regard to the church extension work in connection with the building of the new church at Rainier, and lifting the debt of the churches at St. Helens and Houlton. Rev. Kemp's resignation was not called for and was strongly opposed by the members of the church. He has been the storm center of a bitter fight and has made strong friends and bitter enemies; but it must be admitted by all that he is a man of great energy and considerable ability, and we trust that in his new field these qualities will bring him prosperity. With his family he is soon to move to Portland, where he is at the head of the Kemp Printing Co.

Mr. Belford, manager of the Western Cooperaage Company's factory at Houlton, was a visitor to Rainier on Friday last.

Mr. B. W. Barnes, of Little, Wash., paid friends in Rainier a visit Tuesday. Mr. Barnes is at present in the employ of the Wisconsin Lumber Co. He was formerly bookkeeper for the Rainier Mill & Lumber Company here.

The new Willard Case sawmill will begin active operations January 1. They are busy installing new machinery and laying railroad track up the canyon. Capt. Frank Turner and wife, of Vancouver, B. C., are visiting with Mrs. Turner's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dobbler, of Rainier. Capt. Turner has been on the Yukon river run, from St. Michaels to Dawson for a number of years, but returned last October with the intention of making Vancouver his home. He is engaged in the real estate business at that place, and finds it more pleasant than life on the border of the Arctic circle.

Mr. W. H. Haycke returned Friday night from the hot springs where he has been for the past six weeks taking treatments for inflammatory rheumatism. He is much improved in health.

Mr. W. B. Jameson, who has been temporarily residing in Portland, was in Rainier last Monday looking after his business interests.

The taxable valuation of all the property in the town of Rainier, including about two miles of the A & C railroad is placed at \$150,000, which is certainly not more than one third of its real value. Owing to this low assessment and the charter limitation on the rate that can be levied only about \$375 can be raised by direct taxation for municipal purposes. If the streets are to be graded and improved as they should it is time some move was made toward remodeling the town charter. This is a good subject for action by the Board of Trade.

Mr. Wm. Howe, and family of Dufur, Ore., arrived last week to become residents of Rainier. Mr. Howe is in the employ of the Patterson-Nordby Lumber Co.

Mr. B. W. Reed left Thursday morning for his home in Oakland, Cal., to spend the holidays. His father, W. I. Reed will look after the business during his absence.

Mr. Ole Heglie, an employee of the Columbia River Door Co., had the ends cut off of the second third and fourth fingers of his right hand yesterday by getting them into the planer.

The carrier "Cascades" arrived at the Patterson-Nordby Lumber Company's dock Thursday, and will take on one-half million feet of lumber for San Francisco. This is the first shipment made by water, by this company, but from now on the Co. expects to do most of their shipping by water as the difficulty in securing cars is so great.

The Nome City arrived at the Willard-Case company's dock last Tuesday morning and took on 500,000 feet of lumber, leaving Wednesday night, which may be considered as quick dispatch. In fact, Rainier on many accounts is a more desirable place for ships to load than Portland, and this fact is beginning to be recognized in shipping circles.
