10,000 Acres Near Goble Sold For \$800,000.

agent. The Clark & Wilson Lumber Company was organized two years ago and the mill at Linuton was then bought and enlarged until it now has a capacity of 200,000 feet daity. It covers a large site and owns 160 feet of deep waterfront, along which good docks have been built.

After two years lumbering in Oregon, the Clarks and Wilsons are confident of the fature of the industry in this state. The heavy purchase of timber just closed shows how highly they regard investments of this character.
