THE RIGHT METHOD AT LAST.

The friends of the State Normal School at Monmouth, in view of the Governor's veto of their appropriation, have decided to go before the people under the initiative and ask the voters to select the schools they desire to be continued as a normal institution at the expense of the taxpayers. Drain, Monmouth, Ashland, and Weston will all be placed upon the ballots and the voters can select or reject any or all of them. This is the sensible method of solving the problem, and should have been adopted prior to the last general election instead of invoking the referendum on the general appropriation bill. The schools exist by the sanction and authority of the Legislature, and it appears that they have not the courage to decide which of them shall be retained. They have been hampered in their work by this vacillation, and it is certainly high time the question was definitely settled. Normal training schools are a necessity of the best public schools, but it appears foolish to putter away the taxes in maintaining more than are necessary. Each section containing a normal will vote nearly solid for its local school, and the decision will be rendered by the means of the voters who have no personal or really interests in the matter. Monmouth will undoubtedly be chosen, and that is, of course, the reason her friends favor this method of settling the dispute.

GRANGE CONVENTION.

The Patrons of Husbandry know a good thing when they see it. They saw and appreciated the new courthouse, and, like the good citizens they are, they gave praise where praise was due. The Grangers are not calamity howlers nor perverse fault finders. They have not hesitated to criticize where they thought public officials were lax in the performance of their duty, and we believe their criticisms, except in the case of a few individuals, has been honest and candid. They are an important element in the welfare of the County, representing the middle class, who are not wealthy, but who own their homes and have been the pioneers of our civilization. They come from every section of the county, and no other set of men could be as truly representative of the county's permanent interest. Agriculture is the basis of all industries and an intelligent agricultural population is the greatest safeguard of this country's welfare. The Grange is essentially an educational institution. Within the Grange halls every problem of government is discussed, and while it is true that they are not always governed by wise counsel, the ultimate result of their deliberations is pretty sure to result in action for the general good. That we believe always their motive. They desire nothing but the greatest good of the greatest number, and, in this respect, they are far above many other associations whose object it is to influence legislation.

We are glad to have had the Patrons with us, glad they saw fit to commend the noble building in which their convention was held, and hope they will come again in 1908.

Many Clackamas county people are wondering what caused the recent slump in the price of potatoes, when there was an urgent demand for the product in San Francisco. It was a shipment of 500 car loads of the tubers from the East that caused a slump in the California markets. The farmer that sold his spuds when they were \$1.50 per hundred hit the nail on the head. Those who were holding for a better price, did not count on the big shipment from the East.—Enterprise.

THE PITY OF IT.

An army of men is on strike in Portland. They are losing, directly, in the neighborhood of six thousand dollars per day, and this is only a portion of the financial loss that is being cutted the State of Oregon by their idleness. They are succeeding in inflicting upon capital a much greater thought not a proportionate loss. The capitalists will never miss a luxury from their table. Their children will be as well clothed as ever, and the Easter bonnet of their wives will be just as expensive. They will suffer nothing but a diminution of their earnings, and all the power of the State will be invoked to protect their property if the time comes when despairing men resort to lawless measures. It is a fixed principle that the poor must not violate the law. For the educated and wealthy anarchists, who combine and conspire to rob the consumers of millions annually, there has been built up a system of legal evasion that renders them practically unpunishable. No policeman ever hails them to the city jail, no volley of infantry ever inflicts upon them the death penalty for their crimes. Organized society rightfully protects the rich against the crime of the poor, though it has not as yet devised an effective means of protecting the poor against the crimes of the rich.

This is the fratricide of centuries. On the one side is organized capital. On the other organized labor. A state of perpetual warfare exists between them and what is called peace is never more than an armed truce. Both are intensely selfish and careless of the rights of non-combatants. The strike in Portland affects the whole State, and it may especially affect Columbia County. Those who have no desire to take part in the conflict will be compelled to array themselves on one side or the other. The friendly spirit that exists in many cases between the employer and employed will be done away with and the nihilistic impulse to tear down will take place of the constructive. The financial loss will be but a small part of the harm done, and the worst burden of the conflict will fall, as it always does, upon the woman at home. The sensible economies of honest poverty will give away to biting necessities of destitution, the accumulations in the savings bank will be swept away, the installments upon the home will be unpaid and all the comforts that come with steady employment will be absent; business will be paralyzed throughout the State, and the progress of a great city retarded. A strike is war, and "war is hell."

Is this the best that we can do? The time has gone by when men can claim that they live for themselves alone. We are so knit together that a blow dealt to one portion of the industrial fabric is felt everywhere. "An injury to one is the concern of all." This is the motto of Labor and of Capital; but it has a wider meaning than they have given it. It means that war between them is an injury to the whole country, and there should be power in the people to compel a halt. This is the principle of compulsory arbitration. The differences between organized bodies of citizens should be settled as are the differences between individuals. They should not be permitted to destroy each other or retard the prosperity of the community.

MORE FOREST RESERVES.

Dispatches from Washington indicate that President Roosevelt has added 17,000,000 acres of forest lands to the government reserves, one fourth of which is in Oregon.

The largest reservation in Oregon was an addition of 977,900 acres in the Blue Mountain reserves in Eastern Oregon. Other additions to existing reserves are: 440,000 to the Siskiyou in Southern Oregon, 71,000 acres in the Wenaha reserve 514,000 to the Cascade reserve, mostly in its western border, and 154,000 to the Ashland reserve in south-western Oregon.

To include the timber land of the Coast Range the President created the Tillamook reserve containing 165,000 acres; the Coquille reserve, embracing 140,000 acres, and the Umpqua reserve, with an area of 802,000 acres.

The Willows and Chesnimunt reserves are combined under the name of Imnaha, and 783,000 acres are added.
