LOGGING CAMP AND SAWMILL

Items of Interest Clipped from The Timberman

C. G. Thayer, Rainier, will operate his sawmill at Plymouth this Spring. Peter Mewher has installed a 10,000 capacity sawmill two miles south of Rainier.

W. J. Muckle, Rainier, will cut factory stock this season for the Eureka Planing Mill Company, Rainier.

Patterson Lumber Company, Rainier, has put in 200 feet of wharf and is shipping their output largely by water.

Captain Fred Wilson is installing a single mill four miles south of Rainier. He will use a Lane upright machine.

M. T. O'Connell will finish logging operations at Rainier by the first of May and remove his railroad to another location.

Campbell, Warren & Campbell, are operating a camp near Pres oot. They are using two donkeys and put in about 30,000 feet daily.

Norman Merrill has sold his cedar mill west of Clatskanie to J. W. Lyne, of Mist, who is cutting cedar for the Portland market.

Joseph Erickson & Son, Quincy, have extended their logging road about one mile. They are putting in about 40,000 feet of logs daily.

During the month of March there were shipped from Rainier 6,223,947 feet of lumber, of which 5,351,912 feet went by water and 872,935 feet went by rail.

Krantz Wood Shingle Company, Clatskanie, is exporting its plant steadily, and reports good demand for the product. The plant is cutting about 80,000 shingles per day.

Milton Bowman is putting in a logging camp on Scappoose Bay at Warren. He will use horses. He has about 2,000,000 feet put in from the W. E. Stevens place.

The Michigan Slough Logging Company has installed a camp at Igloo. They are using two donkeys and are putting in 40,000 feet daily. The foreman is a manager of the company.

The Columbia Timber Company, Goble, has added a 35 ton Sixty Locomotive to its road equipment. The holdings of this company are now controlled by the Clark & Wilson Lumber Company of Linton.

Benson Lumber & Logging Company, Clatskanie, is extending its railroad to the Columbia River, necessitating the construction of about a mile of track, which is on a trestle the entire distance.

The Clatskanie Lumber Company, Clatskanie, resumed operations April 8, after an idleness of several months, on account of inability to ship. The output of their mill will be shipped by water, principally.

H. O. Howard, Rainier, will install an additional boiler and donkey at his sawmill three miles south of Rainier. The mill has operated steadily all winter, the output being shipped largely by water.

The interest of Johnson & Brues in Bruce Lumber Company, Scappoose, has been purchased by A. C. Burdick, of Portland, who will operate the plant hereafter under the name of the Mowack Lumber Company.

R. W. Reid, manager of the Rainier Mill and Lumber Company, Rainier, returned late in March from a two weeks' visit to California, where he was looking over conditions among the retail yards. Mr. Reid has purchased a block of water front at Rainier, on which is a large shaft and two warehouses, where the shipment of lumber is made by the mills in the vicinity of Rainier.

A. A. Jackson, who succeeded Foster & Jackson, at Goble, has rebuilt his dam, which is over two miles long. The plant cuts ties principally and has a capacity of about 30,000 feet daily.

Columbia County Logging Company, of Portland, will build a logging railroad from Deer Island into a body of timber they have been acquiring for some time. The company now own about a mile and a half of water frontage and have safe boamge grounds for millions of feet of logs. An easy grade into the Nebatem can be obtained. Seventy-pound steel will be used on the road. It is likely the company will ultimately build a sawmill to work up at least a portion of their holdings.

The new sawmill of the Beaver Lumber Company, Pr-asott, is ready to operate as soon as the raws arrive. The plant is located between the A. & C. track and the Columbia River, and is one of the up-to-date mills of this section. It has a capacity of 100,000 feet in ten hours. The company expects to be ready to operate by the first of May.

The Western Cedar Company is installing a 25,000 capacity sawmill on Fox Creek, two miles south of Rainier. The mill frame is 36x120 feet, and will be equipped with 52-inch double circulars. The output of the plant, which will be ready to operate about the first of July, will be ties and timbers principally. The company has 150 feet of waterfront at Rainier, and will erect a wharf. The course of the flume, which the company has owned for several years, is being changed, and the output of the mill will be flumed to the dock. Wm. Reid is manager of the company.

FOUND DROWNED—The body of a drowned man was found in the river about three miles below Rainier Tuesday morning by a fisherman named H. N. Drum. Coroner Cliff was promptly notified, but found no evidence of violence, and therefore concluded not to put the county to the expense of an inquest. The dead man was about forty years of age and had about two weeks' growth of beard. He was dressed in a suit of dungarees and wore rubber hip boots. In one pocket he had two dollars and fifty cents in silver, but there was nothing on his person to aid in his identification. He had been in the water a long time, and it is probable he was the man who fell from the Nome City while she was loading here about six weeks ago. The body was taken to Rainier, where undertaker Eymann gave it decent burial at the county's expense.

LATER—Undertaker Eymann, in caring for the body, discovered a belt upon the deceased containing \$120 sewed in. As the man who fell off the Nome City had a similar belt on it is almost certain that he is the unfortunate who fell from the boat and was drowned.

A LIVELY ROUNDUP—Marshall Jesse had a lively time last Saturday evening taking a man named Burns to the city jail. Burns and number of others from Apriary, including the chief magistrate of that community, were having what is known as a "good time" in the old town. Burns was especially boisterous when requested to keep the peace and evinced a desire to chew up the marshal and spit him out at the ears. Therefore Marshall Jesse took him in, Burns is a husky citizen, and all the way to the calaboose he made the marshal earn a piece of his salary.
