Talk to Ross. Columbia County Bank. MURDER IN BEAVER VALLEY—Herbert Swarthout was killed at Case's old mill on the Beaver, last Wednesday morning, at about 10 o'clock, by Frank Gardiner, the cause of the tragedy being jealousy on the part of Swarthout, whose wife was housekeeper for Gardiner. Swarthout and wife separated about 18 months ago, in Clark County, and, with her children, she came to Columbia County to work for Gardiner, whose true name is Frank N. Guajardo. Swarthout had visited his wife and children several times, and had threatened to kill Gardiner. He came to the place Tuesday night and repeated his threats. He was ordered out of the house by Gardiner (it being the latter's place) and went back to Rainier, but returned in the morning, when he was met by Gardiner. After some talk Swarthout fired the first shot, when Gardiner, who had procured a 30-30 Winchester, shot twice, the first shot missing and the second tearing off the top of his head. The men could not have been more than twelve feet apart. Gardiner is in the county jail, having walked to Rainier to surrender to the authorities.

Squabs sell for \$3.65 per dozen, and, as the profit is a good one and the market practically unlimited, it would seem as if it were worthy the attention of others.
