(Oregonian) If timber land values in other counties are anywhere near the same as in Columbia County, the plan of having timber land cruised by experts for assessment purposes is likely to prove a very profitable scheme for the counties that have undertaken it. There has been some doubt whether the results would justify the expense of employing cruisers. In Columbia County much of the cruising has been done, and, as an illustration of results, it is asserted that one section that has been assessed heretofore at a little less than \$1000 has timber enough on it to be worth \$64,000 for stumpage. A quarter section, 160 acres, which has been assessed in the past at \$1040, is found to contain timber of the value of \$25,000. The cruiser not only makes an estimate of the quantity of timber of the various grades, but also makes an examination and report upon the soil and topography of the land, so that its value aside from the standing timber, may be ascertained approximately. In case of litigation the expert will be prepared to back up his figures with evidence of the value of the timber. As to the assessment rolls large sums like that mentioned, and quite a number of them, will lighten the tax burden upon farmers generally. What is true of Columbia is probably true of other counties that include heavily timbered land. Having ones examined the timber and estimated its quantity, the work will not have to be done again for a number of years. The only changes in quantity will be those due to sawing logs or burning timber. With the quantity known the value can be easily determined for each year, according to the market value in each particular community. In a period of five or ten years the original cost of the cruising will not be enough to be worthy of mention, provided the work has been well done. A Fortunate Texan Mr. E. W.
