The Northern Pacific Railroad, by its tax agent, has filed a protest with the county board of equalization against the assessment of its track, rolling stock and the ferry boat Tacoma. They requested that the Tacoma's assessment be reduced from \$90,000 to \$30,000, the rolling stock from \$110,000 to \$29,040, and the roadbed from \$65,000 to \$14,520 per mile. As the board will certainly not comply with their request it is probable the matter will be taken to the courts.
