

SALMON DECREASING

The annual report of Fish Warden VanDusen for the year 1907 contains some interesting data in regard to the packs of salmon on the Columbia River for a number of years and shows conclusively that if the fisheries are to be preserved, steps must immediately be taken to stop all fishing in the spawning grounds. Every voter should read this report, it says in part as follows:

The salmon product of the Columbia River canned, and packed under the cold storage processes, and handled by dealers and others on the Oregon side of the river this year (1907) was as follows: Chinooks, 15,798,116 pounds; Steelheads, 1,112,009 pounds; Silversides, 1,045,516 pounds; Bluebacks, 196,102 pounds; and Tules, 57,158 pounds. As compared with the product of 1906, this is a falling off of near 17 per cent with the Chinooks of over 39 per cent with the Silversides, of 28 per cent with the Steelheads and of over 68 per cent with the Bluebacks. I have no figures from the state of Washington showing the product that was handled on that side of the river this year, but I infer from close observations made that the same condition exists on both sides of the river and that the entire river showed a general shortage with all varieties of salmon of about the same proportion.

This year the combined pack of Chinooks, Silversides, Steelheads and Bluebacks on the Oregon side of the Columbia River was, 18,151,743 pounds, whereas, during 1906 it was 22,908,700 pounds.

Comparing the Chinook product of the Columbia River this year with the Chinook product of 1902 or 1903, assuming the theory to be correct that the fish raised from the spawn of 1902 or 1903 would reach maturity and return to the stream of their nativity during 1907, we find that while it is only a trifling short of the 1902 product it has fallen 20 per cent or more below the 1903 pack. Whether this theory be correct or not, it is very plain to be seen that such a condition of affairs is alarming in the face of the extensive hatchery work that has been carried on since 1901, and the matter should be looked to and the wrong corrected by our people before it is too late and this valuable food product is lost to us and four or five thousand of our best and most loyal citizens lose their principal occupation. In 1906 there was a shortage of 8 per cent over the year previous, but the product of 1906 showed a gain of more than 20 per cent over either of the years 1901 or 1902, and every year since 1901 there has been a fair gain over comparative years, under the four or five year theory, until this year which, notwithstanding that the weather and water conditions for the Columbia were more favorable than what they have been for years, the product fell short, as above noted. On our coast streams, our people were confronted with this very same condition of affairs prior to 1901, the product was decreasing gradually year by year on all of those streams on account of excessive fishing which was carried on from the lower harbors to the extreme upper waters where the streams were very narrow, and comparatively few salmon ever reached their spawning grounds, and those that did reach their spawning grounds were soon thereafter seized and marketed by unscrupulous persons, thereby destroying millions of spawn that should have been deposited for a future supply. The situation was alarming, large investments had been made in canning establishments by the packers and in fishing apparatus by the fishermen; a sacrifice had to be made some place for something had to be done to save the product, and, as I have heretofore reported, the legislature of 1901 proved to be equal to the occasion and wisely passed laws confining commercial fishing to the lower waters. Dead lines were established on all of the streams, some of which were several miles below the head of tide, and no fishing above those lines have been carried on since, excepting with hook and line, with the result that every season since, thousands of salmon of all varieties have been enabled on the tides and during the freshest times to get by the lower river fishers and have ascended the streams to their spawning grounds where they are protected and left alone to spawn naturally, or are taken at the hatcheries established to assist nature in that respect. This restrictive measure was somewhat hard at first on the upper river settlers who had been accustomed to doing their fishing right at their own door yard, as it were, but since, they have learned to see where it was wrong, and they are now perfectly willing to drop down on to the lower harbor for their fishing and join with the others in harvesting the product which is now netting them more than double what they used to realize. The good results obtained from this protective measure was very noticeable on all of the coast streams during 1906, and this year, notwithstanding the

fact that it was, considered a very unfavorable season for all of the Coast Streams, on account of the long spell of dry weather throughout the entire fall season, it was very noticeable again, as will be seen by a comparative table herein submitted.

The Columbia River should have been included in this measure at the time it was enacted and the law made a general one as far the state of Oregon was concerned, but the influence brought to bear by the upper river interests was too strong and the Columbia was excepted therefrom. In the face of this, we have ever since 1901 been endeavoring to hold the product for the Columbia, by assisting nature with a system of artificial propagation work that has been carried on persistently and it did look for a time as though we would be able to hold the product for the river, for in 1901, '02, and '03 plenty salmon for hatchery purposes were found in Snake River at Ontario, and in the Wallowa and Grand Ronde Rivers in Eastern Oregon; hatcheries of large capacities were established, and during the 1902 season 4,447 female Chinook salmon were taken in Snake River at Ontario, from which twenty-one million eggs were secured; the same season on the Grand Ronde River 709 female Chinook salmon were taken, from which over three million eggs were secured, and 1173 female Silverside salmon were taken, from which 3,634,000 eggs were secured. Again during the 1903 season at Ontario 4,757 female Chinook salmon were taken, from which twenty-five million eggs were secured; on the Wallowa, 959 female Chinook salmon were taken from which 3,707,000 eggs were secured, and 1,342 female Silversides were taken, from which 2,901,000 eggs were secured.
