This does not only apply to grasses but to grains and all agricultural and horticultural products that are raised in Columbia County.

If you bind, or are raising any new varieties of grains, grasses, or vegetables be sure to save out samples for our county exhibit. Samples of grains, ties should see that their grasses, etc., should not be less than 4 inches in diameter, cut close to the ground, and hung up in the shade to cure. After they are cured they should be wrapped in paper to preserve their natural color. Can use some nice fruits or anything else you have to help fill out our permanent exhibit in glass jars. Mark all samples with your name and address and the name and variety of the article and ship or bring to me at the court house, St. Helens, Oregon. If you cannot do this, notify me and I will come and get it or make arrangements for some one else to do so. Columbia county can, and does raise just as good agricultural and horticultural products as any county in the state but in order to convince the prospective 'settlers and homebuilders of this fact we must place arth at other points. ### THE CATCHER'S JOB

### Considered to be the Hardest On the Team

Although the pitcher is the hardest working man in the team, physically, the catcher has to do most of the brain work and let the eight players in front of him know what the next play will be. In short, he must keep his head and know what his mates are doing all the time, and that is a good deal of respon-

Signaling is one of the best things ever niroduced into baseball, but it has added greatly to the duties of the receiver. Signaling puts the game on a scien ific basis and makes possible the wonderful team

work that characterizes the game today. The backs'op warns the other men of his team of the coming play and at the same time endeavors to keep his opponents in ignorance of the programme. Most of the signals are for the use of the pitcher and catcher, but it is essential that as many of the other fielders should see them as possable.

If there is a man on first and there is a possibility of the runner stealing second, the catcher calls the men to take the throw, the shortstop or second base-

The simpler the signals the better, but they must deceive the opposing When the catcher signals the twirler he usually does so with his right




