PLAIN TRUTH

The Portland Oregonian has been, for the past twenty-five years, a source of information and inspiration to the editor of this paper and all other Oregon editors who were capable of appreciating great ability and a power of expression equalled by few writers and excelled by none in the United States. For over fifty years its editor has, with few exceptions, used his great ability for the public good. We believe he has always adhered to what he conceived to be the right, and his advocacy of great principles has been fearless and has not waited upon popular approval. He has been a true leader of public thought and after the scepter has fallen from his hands there will be no dissenting opinion among the lesser lights of journalism as to his preeminence. His brethren of the country press delight in stinging him occasionally and feel perfectly satisfied when they make the old lion roar. It shows that he is human and has human weaknesses. In response to a recent puncheon to his article he avows: "Senators will come and go; but no man again will hold the primary in the journalism of Oregon for fifty years."

It's all very true, big fellow, and Oregon is fond of you. Never doubt that when the time comes for you to shuffle off this mortal coil the Oregon you have served so well will do full honor to your greatness. All these little matters will be forgotten then; all the acrimony of personal and political discussion will be obliterated and Oregon will grieve over the loss of its foremost citizen and advocate.

PLATT'S OPINION

The Oregonian quotes, approvingly, the opinion of the notorious Senator Platt, of New York, against the Statement No. 1 method of electing United States Senators. It is certain that all senators of the Platt stripe are opposed to the Oregon plan or any other methods that tends toward the election of senators by direct vote of the people. The present method exactly suits them. They have been able, for very many years, to purchase the legislatures of their state or to control them by the power of patronage. The system under which they were elected has brought the Senate into disrepute with the people to such an extent that it is considered an enemy of the public welfare, and to belong to it is no longer considered an honor. It is the citadel of the trusts and corporations, and any method that promises relief should be availed of to change its personnel so that it will in some degree represent the popular will. Statement No. 1 attempts to do this, and, even though its application results in the election of Democratic senators in Republican states the people prefer it to the old method and will not be persuaded to relinquish it. It is idle, however, to attempt to convince the people that the defeat of Mr. Calkins was brought about by Statement No. 1 Republicans. He was defeated by those who thought Chamberlain would not be elected by the Legislature, no matter what vote he received, and that then they would have the power to name the next United States Senator. Had they believed there would be a Statement No. 1 majority in the Legislature, and that the members would be true to their pledges, they would have voted for Mr. Calkins, notwithstanding he was not their
