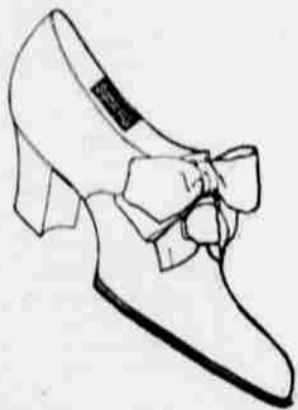

Small premiums will be offered. The admission is expected to be 35 cents, including an excellent dinner. This will be the first agricultural fair of any description ever held in Columbia County and will probably be a starter for a regular annual county fair.
