

NEW BANK BUILDING—The Columbia County bank has let the contract to Jack Lafferty for the construction of a new bank building at the southwest corner of the court house plaza and the strand. It will be two stories, built of St. Helens stone, and will cost, with lot and fixtures, in the neighborhood of \$6,000. The constantly growing business of the bank necessitates that move. When completed it will be the finest bank building in Columbia County.

COAL MINES NEAR SCAPPOOSE—Says the Oregonian: "Coal of what is believed to be very good quality and unlimited quantity was discovered last week on a farm near Scappoose, owned by Dr. Blackford, of this city. The ledge is three feet in thickness and has been traced along a bluff for a distance of 300 feet. The deposit is located about 2 1/2 miles from the station at Scappoose. Yesterday W. Gerrabrant, who rents the farm from Dr. Blackford, came to Portland and announced two more ledges have just been discovered in the same neighborhood. The new veins each measure three feet in thickness and are separated by a sandstone ledge three feet thick. Assays show the coal to possess 45 per cent carbon, 42 1/2 per cent volatile matter, 7.3 per cent water, 4.8 per cent ash, and .4 per cent sulphur. A sample of the coal can now be seen at the office of the Portland Trust Company. No arrangements have yet been made regarding the development of the property."—Mention of this discovery was made several weeks ago in the columns of the *Mist*.

Winton lived in St. Helens in the 60's and married the daughter of one of Columbia County's pioneers. He is son Hoyt. He taught school here and was pastor of the M. E. church. Thirty-one years ago he moved to Astoria and engaged in the practice of law. He was a man of very marked ability and those who heard him say he was a very eloquent pulpit orator. He was a member of the Masonic order, of the Eagles, the A. O. U. W., and of Cushing Post, G. A. R.

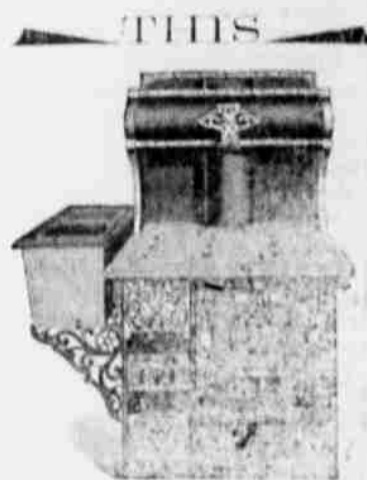
