

DEDICATION DAY.

Opening of Scappoose's New School.

The most important event in the school history of Columbia County was celebrated at Scappoose last Saturday night when the new school building was dedicated in the presence of a crowded audience of local patrons, visitors from other parts of the county, the county superintendent, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Principal Byland Rainier participating. Short talks were made by Superintendent Collins, J. R. Lillard, Asa Holaday, T. C. Watts, B. Dillard and E. H. Flagg, the principal address of the evening being delivered by State Superintendent Ackerman.

Professor Ackerman said it was most enjoyable event in his history as a school official, because it marked inauguration of the system of joint districts for which he had contended for years, and which he believed would result in conferring upon rural districts educational advantages which could be secured in no other way. He believed system of transporting the smaller children from remote parts of the district would prove successful and would result in more regular attendance and greater actuality than prevails in smaller districts. He complimented Scappoose as being the first district in the State to take full advantage of the law and promised to give it special mention, with names of the school building and delivery wagons in his next biennial report to the State Legislature. He asserted Scappoose has the best school building in the state outside of an incorporated city and that it is the only district that has a beautiful tract of five acres of land surrounding the school edifice.

The remarks made by Mr. T. C. Watts, Reuben, were especially interesting. Watts is one of four survivors of the girls who attended the pioneer school at Scappoose, built in 1854, when what now Columbia was a part of Washington county. The other three are Mrs. E. Watts and H. C. Lamberson of Scappoose and John Lamberson of Houl-

The Scappoose school building certainly deserves all the praise given it. The cost, when all the bills are in, will probably exceed \$15,000. The location isatty and in plain view of passing trains, so that it will be a constant and valuable advertisement of the intelligence and enterprise of the community. From basement to cupola it is modern and sanitary. The basement has separate play rooms for the children in rainy weather, fitting and ventilating apparatus, toilets, etc., while outside of the buildings are anti-septic tanks. The second and third stories are devoted to class rooms, principal office, library, and a spacious auditorium. The assessable wealth of the district is over one million dollars, but it will soon no very heavy tax be necessary to maintain the school and pay off the debt within a reasonable period. A corps of four teachers has been secured and school began last Monday.

G. Watts, chairman of the board of directors, presided over the meeting. The Mist extends congratulations to the directors and patrons of the Scappoose school, and predicts that in ten years from now their only regret will be if they did not make it a twenty thousand instead of a fifteen thousand dollar building. The growth of the country before that time crowd the building to capacity and the increase in assessable wealth will have more than doubled. We hope St. Helens and Houlton will watch the course of events and do a little thinking.
