After the argument the board concluded to raise on the railroad from \$35,000 to \$40,000 per mile, and to lower the stock from \$5,000 to \$3,000 per mile, making the total assessment \$47,000 per mile.

Richardson, an Oregon pioneer of St. Helens, died at his home at 800 First street, on Tuesday last, funeral services held at the Episcopal Church in St. Helens yesterday. (Thursday) Richardson being on Germany. Mr. Richardson was well known to the people of St. Helens as he made frequent visits here. He was born in New York, and was 80 years old at the time of his death. He crossed the Pacific to California in 1853, coming to Oregon in 1858. He was married 40 years ago in Iowa. He took up a homestead in Clark County, Washington, but afterwards owned and lived on the place occupied by Joe Kuhns, at the mouth of the Lewis river. He is survived by three daughters and two sons: Richardson of this place, Dave Richardson of Portland, Mary Richardson of Seattle, Mrs. J. Spencer of Brownsville, Ore., and Mrs. S. Hazletine of Lewiston.

DEATH OF MRS. BALLAGH—Mrs. Bertha Ballagh, wife of Edison Ballagh, died in Astoria on Tuesday last, of typhoid fever, after a very painful and complicated sickness. The funeral will take place at Kalama tomorrow. Mr. Ballagh and his wife had resided at St. Helens several months, and their friends here are greatly grieved over her death, and extend their heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved husband.

DEATH OF MRS. CLEMENT—Mrs. Belle Clement, daughter of Jonathan Moore, one of the pioneers of Clatsop Island, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Orin Abel, in this city this (Friday) morning.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Miller was called to Clatskanie last Saturday to investigate the dealings of J. C. Lange with the farmers of the Nehalem Valley. Lange leased the plant of the Nehalem Valley Creamery Company some time ago, agreeing to pay the market price in Portland, less one and one-half cents per pound for butter fat. He purchased about \$1500 worth of butter fat, manufactured it into butter, sold it and shipped. He was arrested at Clatskanie just as he was boarding the train and held to await Mr. Miller's arrival. Lange had also issued about \$400 in checks on the Clatskanie bank, but stopped their payment. Mr. Miller came to the conclusion that there was no good criminal case against him, so the criminal action was dropped and a civil suit instituted, the balance due Lange from the bank being garnisheed.
