THE LOCAL OPTION ELECTION IN NOVEMBER.

Petitions are in circulation, and no doubt a sufficient number of signers will be secured, calling for a special election to be held in this county on Tuesday, November 23, 1909, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be permitted in the county.

Now get your thinking cap on and decide how you intend to vote.

There are two arguments in favor of the saloon:

1st. The license money in the incorporated cities saves the taxpayers several thousand dollars annually.

2nd. It is hard to enforce prohibition and doubtless there will be some illegal selling of liquor.

These are the only arguments in favor of the traffic and they are fallacious.

For every dollar paid in to the treasury by saloons the taxpayers have to put up five times the amount for maintenance of paupers, and criminals created by the use of alcoholic stimulants.

The saloon is a tax on every other industry.

Men cheat the merchant and starve their families in order to satisfy the appetite for liquor.

It is the frequent cause of murder, and indirectly the cause of a great percentage of all crimes committed.

It is said that "moderate drinking" harms no one; but without "moderate drinking" there could be no "immoderate drinking," nor could saloons thrive. If the patrons of saloons averaged but four glasses of beer or whisky per day the saloon keepers would soon go out of business. Knowing this, they use every means to promote intemperance, and were there is occasionally a saloon keeper who attempts to keep within the law, the greater number of them seek every opportunity to evade it, and there are ten times more violations of the liquor laws in wet states than of the prohibition laws in dry states. This is inevitable from the character of the business. Men do not engage in it from choice, but because they conceive it to be an easy way to make money. As a rule it injures the man behind the bar fully as much as his customer and many of them will be benefited by the enactment of a prohibition law.

Think it over, and if the good done by the liquor traffic is equal to the evil it inflicts on mankind, vote "wet" but if not, vote "dry."

St. Helens was defeated in a rather poorly played ball game last Sunday by the Ridgefield nine. The game was utterly lacking in anything either fast or sensational and the crowd of spectators was sadly disappointed. Mr. Morton pitched and if he had fairly good support would have won his game. The score at the finish stood 7 to 6 in favor of the visitors.

COLUMBIA'S EXHIBIT AT THE STATE FAIR.

The editor of the Mist wishes to thank all who contributed to Columbia County's exhibit at the State Fair. In spite of the hardest kind of lack it was a creditable showing, and those from Columbia County who attended seemed to be well satisfied. In fruits and vegetables we were clearly ahead of anything in the pavilion, and had it not been for the failure of the Nehalem grains and grasses to arrive until Friday—too late to be of any use we would have secured second instead of third premium. There is no good accomplished by grieving over what might have been, but next year—if the court decides to have an exhibit—precautions will be taken to have the exhibit on the grounds in ample time. The main exhibit was shipped from St. Helens on Thursday, September 9th, and was allowed to remain on the Hassalo's dock in Portland until the next Tuesday, arriving in Salem Tuesday night, and necessitating the employment of several people the greater part of the night in order to get it in place for Wednesday morning. The booth attracted fully as much attention as any other feature in the building, and the inquiries made were numerous and were indicative of a desire to investigate our resources with the intention of locating here. Several thousand copies of the Mist, big edition were distributed, and none were given away carelessly. No copies were scattered about the grounds, as is generally the case with advertising matter, and this indicates that they were considered of

sufficient value to be taken home and carefully read. Many who resided in other States asked for and were given several copies to send to friends and relatives at their old homes. We believe good work was done and that the result will demonstrate that advertising pays a county as well as it does individuals.

THE SUTTON CASE.

The verdict of the military board in the Sutton case will not be accepted as final or just by Mrs. Sutton or by the general public. The tendency of members of the military profession to stand in for the purpose of covering up any scandal that may affect their fellows is so notorious that nothing but a congressional investigation will ever satisfy disinterested persons that Sutton took his own life, and even if that fact were fully established it would not prove that he was not done to death by his assailants. That he was overcome by numbers and brutally beaten admits of no doubt. Possibly he was not a lovable character, though one woman loved him as her boy, and will pursue his assailants to the bitter end. He was a Catholic, and, so long as the stigma of suicide clung to him the church denied him the privilege of interment in consecrated ground. The church authorities now believe he did not commit suicide, and have removed the ban. Their belief is generally shared by the public, and the mother proposes to push the investigation by every means wealth and seal can procure, until the responsibility for her son's death is definitely fixed and proper punishment meted out. The hoodlums who disgraced the training given them by the Government will receive little sympathy, and it is to be hoped the full truth will ultimately be known.

LIVESTOCK AT A. Y. P.

Finding the first buildings erected for the live stock show at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific-Exposition, which will be held from September 27 to October 6, completely inadequate to handle the enormous number of animals which have been entered, the department of works at the Exposition, has found it necessary to double the size of the barns.

The new structure will be 120 feet in length by 50 feet in width, and it will be completed in time for the opening of the livestock show on September 27. The work is being rushed and a large force of men is now at work.

In all 2182 animals have been entered by the two hundred and fifty breeders represented. This stock is coming from practically every state of the United States and Province of Canada. Many of the breeders have imported the best foreign stock to exhibit in the hopes of drawing down prizes with European animals. In the show there will be 288 horses, 899 cattle, 323 swine, and 872 sheep.

SAVING MONEY.

The chances are that the home merchant thought it out this way:

The next time a customer comes into your store and tells you that he can buy one of your regular \$29 refrigerators from a retail catalogue house for \$17.25 why, simply say to him: "All right, I will sell you this refrigerator for \$17.25 providing you will do for me just what you do for the catalogue house."

If a customer agrees, then say to him: "First pay me the purchase price—then I want \$1.00 for express charges and a half dollar for delivering to your home. I also want ten cents for an express order and postage, and—added to this, I shall have to have sixty cents, which represents the refrigerator's proportion of the taxes I pay for the support of local schools and government, and the contributions I make to local churches and worthy charities. This makes a total of \$29.35, which please pay. Then I will have the back of the refrigerator split and the front badly mangled—to match one I recently saw

shipped from a catalogue house, due to careless packing. And to make the job complete I will deliver the refrigerator—wrapped and packed—some day week after next, at which time you would get the other refrigerator, if you were to order it today."

And then, if your customer does not surrender it is because his hide is bullet proof.
