DEMAND INCREASED WAGES—The Paving Cutters' Union, at its last meeting decided to demand an increase in their rate of pay from \$2.00 per thousand to \$2.50, the raise to take effect the first day of April. There are over a hundred of these men employed here, and they are now earning from \$5 to \$3 per day, the average being about \$6 per day, which would seem to be pretty good wages. To the blockmakers a strike in support of this demand would mean a loss of over six hundred dollars per day, and the holding up of it possibly the loss of contracts. Mr. Phillip, who has the greatest number of men employed, states that he cannot comply with the men's demands, and if they are persistent in it he will have to close down. To an outsider the demand seems unreasonable and we hope the Union will reconsider its action.

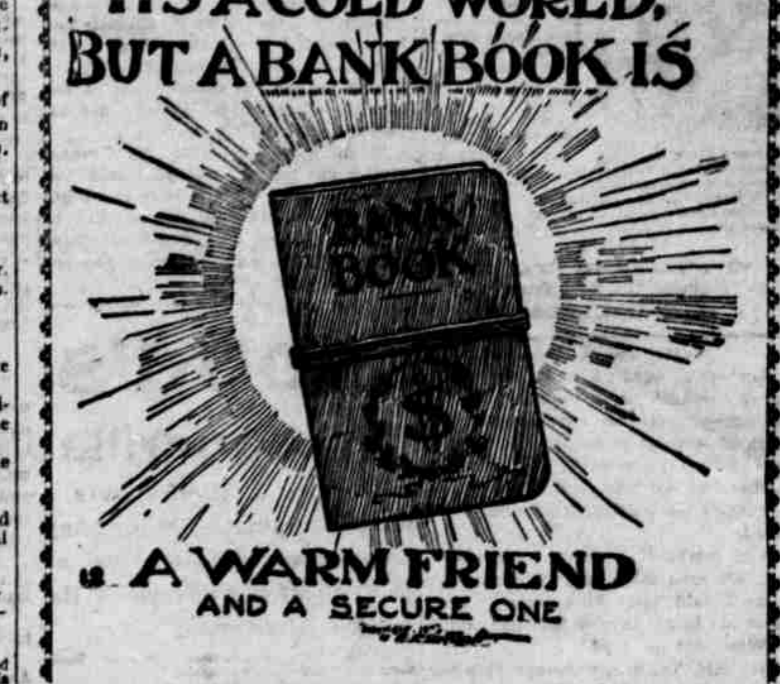
