

# TO FRUIT GROWERS.

The formation of a County Horticultural Society has been postponed until Friday next, at 2 p. m., at the county court room in St. Helens. Mr. Millard O. Lowndale will be present and give instructions as to the best methods of raising and marketing fruit. All are invited to be present.

## LOCAL

A million feet a day for ten days is the amount of lumber that has been shipped from this port by the St. Helens Mill Co. and for that space of time lumber shipments from St. Helens exceeded those from the City of Portland. In the matter of quick dispatch, also, the record was broken, the Casco loading 515,000 feet in seventeen hours and the Yosemite 914,000 feet in 20 hours. Vessels under charter to Chas. R. McCormick & Co., and which were dispatched from St. Helens within a period of ten days are: The schooners Alvin, King Cyrus, Bangor, Virginia and Jewett; steamers Marboffer, Casco, Station and Saginaw; also their own steamers, the Yellowstone, Shoshone, Yosemite and Klamath. This makes a million feet per day for St. Helens or ten millions for a period of ten days.
