### ELIZABETH PERRY'S FUNERAL

And a Very Interesting Letter From A Friend of Over Sixty Years.

The funeral of Mrs. Elizabeth Perry, which occurred at the Methodist church at Houlton on Wednesday, April 13, was attended by a much greater number of people than could gain admittance to the building, and they came from all parts of Columbia County and from many distant points, drawn together by an earnest desire to pay the last tribute of respect to their good friend, Rev. Bruce Wolverton, the pioneer Christian minister of this County, who conducted baptismal services here over forty years ago, and who was an intimate friend of Mrs. Perry, conducted the funeral services. The burial offerings were very beautiful and choice, rare china lilies covering the coffin. In addition to the relatives those contributing flowers were: Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. McBride, Congregational Ladies' Aid of University Park, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Dolman, B. F. Gilmer and family, J. Kendall Blakesley, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Scott, Mr. and Mrs. Burdick, Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Handy, and one of beautiful wildflowers from the children of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Lamont.

Of peculiar interest at this time to those who knew Mrs. Elizabeth Perry is the following letter from Mrs. Jane K. Smith, of Astoria, who had enjoyed her friendship over sixty years. It was received by Mr. N. A. Perry the day after his mother's death:

Mr. N. A. Perry, Houlton, Ore.—  
My Dear Friend:

I am so sorry to hear of the sickness of my lifelong friend, your mother. She stopped off and spent a day with me on her last trip to the seaside. She was so spry, and mentally to me she seemed a wonder. Oh, it was a happy day we spent together. She had so many kind remarks to make of all our old-time friends, so charitable in her feelings toward her neighbors, so considerate of all. As she was leaving the house she turned to me and said, "What word are you going to send to Della Kelly?" I reproached myself for not thinking, and old Aaron and Mrs. Broyles came right before me in my imagination, and I thought, Am I going to forget the child of their old age?

My first recollection of Elizabeth Crandall Perry was in Bloomington, Iowa, in my father's house. She came to see me just about the time your parents started for Oregon. It was not long after they were married and I think I was about five years old. This is the picture I have in my mind: She was sitting in a rocking chair, and I was attracted just as close as I could get to her, leaning on the arm of the chair, looking up into her face, thinking how sweet and pretty she looked as she was talking to me. I got closer and closer until I got my toes pinched under the rocker. At this interval I fell in love with her and have been in love with her ever since.

We came to Oregon in '47, and in '49, while your father, my father, and Uncle Sam Kinney were gone to the mines in California, Sister Perry, with her babe Frank, stayed at Uncle Sam's, a half mile from our home. Then, in this thinly settled country, where pioneers were all like "kafunks," as we western people used to say, though we sometimes lived miles apart, we always "kept track" of each other, and have for upwards of sixty years. She has always possessed a beautiful, lovely character. She was a peacemaker. "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall see God."

Please include this to your mother and tell her I hope and pray she may be able to make another and longer visit when the sunshine comes again and she is restored to health. Give my love to your own family and I love all that are left that remember me.

### ORDINANCE NO. 98.

An ordinance adopting certain rules for the government of the proceedings of the Common Council of the City of St. Helens; providing for the meetings thereof, and adopting an order of business:

The People of the City of St. Helens do ordain as follows:

The City of St. Helens does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. The council shall hold its regular meetings once each and every week, at the council chamber to be selected by them, and the weekly meeting shall be held on Monday of each week, except when it falls on a legal holiday, in which case the council shall meet on the next day following.

Sec. 2. Unless expressly otherwise ordered by the council upon its adjournment, or by the Mayor in convening the council from the first day of April to the first day of October, shall be held at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. and from the first day of October to the first day of April at 7:30 p. m.

Sec. 3. At the meetings of the Council the business before it shall be taken up in the following order, unless by the consent of the council, the Mayor shall otherwise direct:

1. Petitions, remonstrances, memorials and communications.
2. Reports of standing committees.
3. Reports of special committees.
4. Reports of officers.

5. Business on the table.
  6. Reading of ordinances.
  7. Claims against the city, provided that claims shall be acted on only at the first regular meeting in each month.
  8. Propositions, motions and miscellaneous matters.
- Sec. 4. At each regular meeting of the Council the minutes of the last regular meeting, and the minutes of adjourned or called meetings, if any, for the week previous, shall be read before the order of business is called, and if there be no objection the mayor shall approve the same, as corrected, and after such approval they shall not be changed or corrected; provided, no objection shall be considered except sustained by the council.

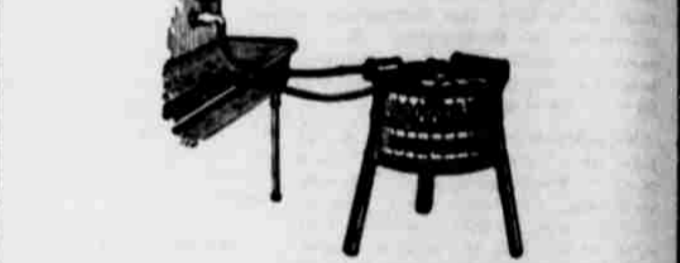
