DEATH OF LYMAN MERRILL—Another Columbia County pioneer passed over the great divide when Lyman Merrill of Columbia City, brother of George Merrill of Deer Island, died at the Good Samaritan hospital on Monday last, April 18, 1910, of cancer of the stomach, at the age of 75 years. Lyman Merrill was a pioneer of 1847 and belonged to the Oregon Pioneers Association. He settled in Columbia County in 1850 and had been a resident here ever since. He leaves, beside his brother George, one sister, Mrs. Furest Thorp of East Portland. Lyman Merrill drove an ox team across the plains from Peoria County, Illinois, when but thirteen years of age, coming with his parents to Oregon City. He followed farming all his life and was a hard working, unostentatious good citizen. The funeral took place at the Kinder cemetery.
