### HOW FUNNY.

A Washington paper prints the following and the Oregonian copies it into its good-boy column:

Any legislator who goes to Olympia next fall pledged to vote for an unknown candidate for United States Senator, for pledges, if given at all, will be given before the primary election, will violate his oath of office; an oath that obligates him to act in conformity with the state constitution; and the state constitution provides for the election of a United States Senator by the State Legislature as a whole, and not by individual members hampered with ante-election pledges.

It may be that Mr. Bryan would have signed the bill. Theoretically he is a demagogue, but we doubt if he would put his theories in practice should the opportunity offer. 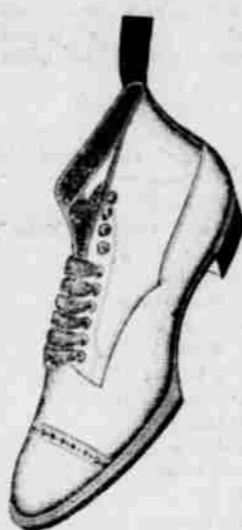

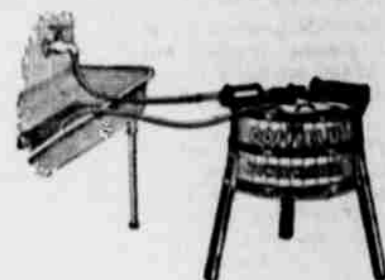
