THE INGLIS PLANT BURNS.

Fire Destroys Property Valued at About \$75,000.

The Oregon Lumber Company's plant at Inglis was destroyed by fire at about 3:45 p. m. Tuesday, and with it went six other buildings and about one million feet of lumber. The loss, instead of being \$300,000 as stated in the Evening Telegram, will not exceed one-third of that amount and is expected to total about \$75,000. The fire originated in the engine room during the absence of the firemen, and its cause is unknown. As to whether the plant will be rebuilt cannot now be told. The Hood River people, who appear to have charge of the corporation's concerns in Oregon, were expected to be at Inglis yesterday. They will report to headquarters at Ogden, Utah, where the decision will be made. The only casualty during the fire happened to the engineer, who had his head burned by a steam jet while trying to get the steam pump to work-
