DEATH OF JOHN DIBBLE—Mr. John Dibble, one of the oldest and best known residents of Rainier, died Tuesday morning at ten minutes after seven, of heart trouble. Mr. Dibble has been ailing for the past four or five years, but not until about two years ago was his trouble considered serious. He became gradually weaker until the end came as above stated. Mr. Dibble was born in Wood stock, New Brunswick, Dec. 3, 1837, and was, consequently, 72 years and 7 months old at the time of his death. He was married to Miss Sarah Weston Blanchard November 13th, 1862, at Woodstock, N. B. Mr. Dibble is survived by his wife, his daughter Mrs. E. Clark, and his son H. Robert Dibble, all of whom are living in Rainier. Mr. Dibble came to Rainier with his family in February, 1860, when there were but four buildings in the city owned by white men—the store, saw mill and residence of Jean Blanchard, and the residence of Joseph Silva. At this time there was also a band of Flathead Indians living in the east end of town, in what is now the north end of Dobbins' Addition. After the suicide of old Chief Tom the camp was abandoned, the buildings burned and the site used as an Indian burying ground. During his long residence in Rainier Mr. Dibble has been identified with many of the larger interests of the city and at the time of his death he was the owner of the Rainier Independent Telephone Company, Vice President of the State Bank of Rainier, President of the Columbia County Bank, and the owner of the biggest stock ranch in Columbia County. When Rainier was organized into a town Mr. Dibble was one of its first councilmen. Funeral arrangements had not been made at the time of the receipt of this news, but the body will be taken to Portland and placed in the family vault.

\$1,000,000 FIRE IN PORTLAND—At 12:50 a. m. Thursday one of the worst fires ever experienced in the City of Portland broke out in the old Exposition Building and about seven blocks were burned over. At least two lives were lost and probably more. One hundred and fifty houses were burned to death and the total property loss is more than \$1,000,000. Among the buildings destroyed was the Multnomah Club, Exposition Building, Glendora Hotel, three apartment houses, several saloons and other business houses, and a number of residences.
