### DROUTH RESISTANT ALFALFA VARIETIES

Drowth resistance of alfalfas is discussed in bureau of plant industry bulletin No. 169, by J. M. Westgate, agronomist in charge of alfalfa and clover investigations. He says:

In addition to the variegated strains of alfalfa being harder than corresponding strains of ordinary alfalfa, it has also been observed that the variegated alfalfas are usually somewhat more drowth resistant than the ordinary variety. The apparent correlation between hardness and drowth never received an entirely satisfactory explanation. The fact that the hardy, drowth-resistant, yellow-flowered alfalfa constitutes a small percentage of the parentage of these variegated strains suggests the origin of these characteristics. It is possible that the smaller number of stomata observed in both the Medicago falcata and the variegated alfalfa may offer a partial explanation of the drowth resistance, but it is difficult to see how this would materially affect the hardness of strain unless the growth be rendered less succulent during the periods of relative high winter temperatures which sometimes occur. The Grimm alfalfa, sand lucern and Baltic alfalfa have all proved relatively drowth resistant. In certain tests the Grimm alfalfa has proved drowth resistant in North Dakota, Montana, Nebraska, Eastern Colorado, Utah and Eastern Washington. The Baltic alfalfa has proved drowth resistant at Highmore, South Dakota.

The following weights of hay are reported to have been produced without irrigation by Mr. Paris Gibson, of Great Falls, Mont., in 1908. Each plot was one acre in extent and the entire product was weighed. The hay was weighed when in the usual condition for stacking and was not entirely dry.

Canadian alfalfa, (variegated), 7,505 pounds; sand lucern (variegated), 6,425; Turkestan alfalfa, 5,490; Wheeler alfalfa (variegated), 5,490; Nebraska dry land alfalfa, 4,700.

The normal rainfall at Great Falls, Mont., is 14 inches.

### Kherson Oats.

The Kherson oat was brought from Russia by Professor F. W. Taylor, of the University of Nebraska, in 1896, and thoroughly tested by the Nebraska station as to its adaptability to the corn belt of the United States, according to Farmers' bulletin 222, U. S. department of agriculture, which quotes from Nebraska station bulletin 82 as follows:

"The climatic condition most favorable to the growth of oats does not usually obtain in the 'corn belt,' and it has been difficult to find a variety of oats well adapted to this region. It is a curious fact that although the great corn-producing states are the largest producers of oats, they are not states in which the yield per acre is high. An oat to produce well in Nebraska, and particularly in the central and western part, should be very early in maturing and should not run to straw." Such a variety was found in the Kherson government in Russia, where the soil and climatic conditions (small and uncertain rainfall) are similar to those of the Great Plains.

The Kherson oat is vigorous, but not a rank grower. The straw is very short, the leaves are broad and expose a large surface. The panicles are spreading, i. e., it is not a side oat. The berries are light yellow, small, but numerous, and have a thin hull. It usually weighs well to the bushel and matures very early.

The results of the tests of the variety that it is "peculiarly suited to Central and Western Nebraska on account of its habits of growth. Although it usually yields well in Eastern Nebraska, there are other varieties that, in the river counties at least, compare favorably with it. West of that the tests indicate that it is earlier, yields better and weighs heavier than any other variety, with the possible exception of the Texas Red. It has steadily outyielded the Texas Red on the station farm. In the dry season of 1901 it showed remarkable drowth-resisting qualities."

The indications, the bulletin states, are that in introducing the Kherson oat the Nebraska station has rendered a great service to farmers of that large section of our western domain where the rainfall is too scanty or uncertain to insure good crops of ordinary varieties of oats.

### Seeding Grains.

A recent bulletin on crops for dry farming, issued by the experiment station of Montana Agricultural college, contains the following regarding seeding grains:

The crops ought to be planted on a moist, well pulverized seed bed. This can best be brought about by plowing in the spring, following immediately with the disc and harrow and cultivating the surface after each rainy period. Early seeding, from August 1 to September 10, is recommended.

### New Varieties Promising.

After having discovered the first causes and worked out our methods of soil culture and crop management, our increased development and success will depend upon two kinds of invention. It is probable that our present methods of applying power and our present implements and machines will become obsolete with perfection of mechanical invention. It seems to me, however, that the greatest promise centers in improvement and creation of new forms of domesticated plants.—B. C. Buffum, in dry farming bulletin.

### RECOGNITION FOR NICARAGUANS

Kaiser Wilhelm Expresses Interest and Esteem.

Practically Takes Opposite Stand From United States—Something Back of Movement.

Washington—Germany has formally put the stamp of her approval on the Madriz government in Nicaragua.

This information reached Washington through confidential channels outside the State department on the heels of the announcement of a recent engagement at Pearl Lagoon, in which the Estrada forces, aided by a force of American planters, inflicted a serious defeat on the Madriz navy and disabled the gunboat San Jacinto.

Germany's action was taken in April, before the recent series of Estrada victories.

No other European government, so far as available information shows, has adopted a similar attitude. With the exception of Germany, they have contented themselves with retaining, with the Madriz government, the relations which had existed with that of Zelaya, the predecessor of Madriz, and have taken no particular notice of the struggle which has been devastating Nicaragua.

Germany, however, has made a definite though confidential announcement of her sympathy with the Madriz faction. This declaration was contained in a letter from Emperor William of Germany to Madriz, written on April 26 from Strasburg. Following is a translation of the document:

"Wilhelm, by the grace of God, Emperor of Germany and king of Prussia, to the president of Nicaragua:

"Great and Good Friend: I am informed by your letter of the 27th of December of the year past, that your excellency was elected president of the republic by the merited confidence of your fellow citizens and that your excellency entered upon your most honorable duties on the 21st of said month.

"I beg you to accept, Mr. President, my congratulations on this event and be assured also that my government will endeavor to maintain and cultivate the best relations which happily already exist between the German Empire and the Republic of Nicaragua.

"Extending to you thanks for your benevolent desires, I assure you of my best wishes for your personal welcome and for that of the Republic of Nicaragua, and for both my greatest respect.

WILHELM II."

The significance of the personal letter from the emperor of Germany to Madriz, in the opinion of those who are acquainted with its existence, is considerably increased by information, which was permitted to emanate from the State department.

This was to the effect that the department has received a communication which stated that the Madriz faction had offered a Nicaraguan island as a coaling station to a European power in return for intervention in behalf of the Madriz government.

### MONOPLANES ARE BEST.

Win Nearly All Prizes and Make Best Records at Rheims Meet.

Bethany Plains, Rheims, France.—The international meeting, at which new records for height, distance, speed and time were set, closed July 10. The meeting was a triumph for monoplanes, which made all the records and carried off the majority of the prizes.

The experts declare that the most important achievement was the record made by Leon Morane, who attained a speed of 106 kilometers—65.93 miles—an hour. They believe that this will be followed soon by a speed of 180 to 200 kilometers.

The distance and duration records established by M. Labouchere, 340 kilometers—211.14 miles—in four hours, 37 minutes and 45 seconds were broken by Olievager, who made a magnificent flight of 393 kilometers—244.44 miles—in five hours, three minutes and five seconds.

### 500 Americans Will Fight.

Montgomery, Ala.—An officer of the Alabama National Guard will pick 500 men at the encampment at Chickamauga next week, who will volunteer for duty in Nicaragua, according to a report here.

It is declared that this officer and his men will sail for Nicaragua soon after the encampment closes and will be used to bring to an end the hostilities between Madriz and Estrada. It is not stated on which side the Americans will fight. Neither can it be learned from what point the expedition will sail nor the date.

### Flames Under Control.

Visalia, Cal.—The forest fire which has been burning on the Sierra slopes near General Grant National park, and which entered the forest of giant trees 50 miles east of here, is thought to be now under control. Backfiring has been resorted to in order to save the fire between two creeks. The fire had eaten into the reserve but none of the trees were burned, although the escape was narrow. A large force of soldiers, civilians and rangers has been fighting the flames for three days.

### Coach Drops Over Cliff.

Yosemite, Cal.—A four-horse stagecoach, carrying 11 passengers, for El Portal, the gateway of the Yosemite national park, went over a cliff into the Merced river, a fall of 100 feet. One man and three women were carried down with the stage and injured severely. The other passengers and driver jumped in time. Two horses were killed. The identity of the victims of the accident or extent of their injuries could not be learned.

### Forest Fires Disastrous.

Eau Claire, Wis.—A survey of the districts in Northern Wisconsin which have suffered through forest fires brings the estimate of the total damage of the past three weeks to about \$4,000,000.
