Billy Moriarty was brought before Justice Watkins last Wednesday morning on a charge of horse stealing. He waived examination and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury, which meets in October. His bond was placed at \$1500. All of the horses alleged to have been taken by Moriarty have been found and returned to their owners. The last one to be recovered was the property of Alexander Aesk, which had been purchased by a man living on the East Side, Portland.

After being out all night, the jury in the case of the administratrix of the Estate of Wallace John vs. the Clatskanie Lumber Co. were discharged at about ten o'clock Wednesday morning, having failed to agree. John was killed on the 6th day of last November while working in the mill of the defendant company, by being struck by a piece of timber on live rolls and being thrown back against the main saw, and the complaint charges that the accident was due to the act of an incompetent fellow servant operating the live rolls. Graham & Cretton and Davis & Moulton represented the plaintiff and M. E. Miller, of this city, and Attorney Sen of Portland were the lawyers for the defense. The arguments were treated by both sides. We are informed that nine of the jury were in favor of awarding damages, while three were not.
