At the Council meeting last Monday night the contract for a new City Hall was awarded to E. A. Crouse and Frank Wilkins, the contract price being \$5800. This hall will fill a long felt want. The lower floor will be occupied by the council room, fire department and roomy quarters for the commercial club, with a large room for rent. The club will also pay the city a good rental, so that as an investment the new building will pay good interest. The entire upper floor will be used as a hall, and in this respect St. Helens will no longer be out-classed by every place on the river where there is a post office. The building will be 44 x 90, and there will be a twelve foot stage at the end of the hall, with dressing rooms at each end of it. This will leave ample space for the dance floor, which will probably be of first grade fir, though there has been some talk of putting in one of hardwood. The council does not feel that they would be justified in this extra outlay, but there were a number of private citizens talking of raising the necessary money by subscription. If there is to be anything done in this line it should be at once.
