During the recent Pacific Loggers Congress which was held in Portland a visit was paid to the scene of the operations of the Chapman Timber Company, of Scappoose, and the Timberman describes it as follows: The visitors to the camp of the Chapman Timber Co., Scappoose, consisted of a party of about eighty, who were taken in a private car. The day was devoted to viewing the extensive operations of this modern plant. The Chapman Timber Co. has twelve miles of well constructed roadbed, extending almost to the summit of the Scappoose mountains on about a 2 1/2 per cent grade. In its operations it uses four locomotives and 12 logging engines. The machine shop is one of the most modern on the Coast. Practically the entire camp is on wheels. The offices, bunk houses, cook house, commissary, dining rooms and the home of Superintendent James McNaughton are built on cars of extra wide dimension. The camp is electric lighted throughout. The Chapman Timber Co. with other allied companies, control about 100,000 acres of timber in the vicinity of Scappoose, and will this year, put in about 80 million feet of logs. Their holdings extend into the Nehalem Valley, which can be reached on about a 5 per cent grade. The out put of this company is dumped into Willamette Slough, about 18 miles below Portland. At the landing the most modern facilities for handling the logs are in use, consisting of automatic unloader and drag saw for bucking, most of which is done in the boom. Here also are maintained suitable quarters for the boom crew. The operations of the company are presided over by Henry Turish, president; J. P. Bradshaw, manager, and James McNaughton, superintendent.
