TO THE VOTERS OF HOULTON

(Concluded from Page 4.)

The Council shall by ordinance provide for making an assessment district covering the streets to be improved, to make an equitable apportionment of the expense of said improvement among the owners of the property affected, based upon the value of the real estate only, as determined by the last previous County assessment; to provide a lien docket and prescribe a mode of collecting the necessary tax or taxes according to the sale and redemption of property sold for non-payment of taxes.

Section 9. The Council is further authorized and empowered to sell warrants at not less than par and drawing no more than six per cent interest, the payment of which shall be guaranteed by an assessment district, which shall become due and payable as asked for in aforesaid petition or as may be determined by said Council, payable in installments, but final payment shall not in any instance extend beyond the period of ten years.

Section 10. The Council is fully empowered to provide and determine everything necessary and convenient concerning such improvements and repairs, and the City of Houlton shall not in any event be liable for any damages to any person by reason of any defect in any sidewalks, cross walks, streets, alleys, bridges, public grounds, public buildings or ditches unless said City shall have had notice of said defect or dangerous place with reasonable time to remove or repair said defect before the happening of said accident, and in no case shall more than one hundred dollars be recovered from said City for accident or injury.

CHAPTER 10 SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE

Section 1. Whenever in the opinion of the Council, a sewerage system is necessary for the health and convenience of the City or any of the districts above referred to, they shall by ordinance proceed to declare such a system necessary, and shall have the power and authority to pass all needful and necessary ordinances for the installation of a complete system of sewerage in the district or districts affected.

Section 2. The Council shall have full power and authority to use all streets and alleys for the purpose of laying mains and laterals, and if the topography of any portion of the City requires they are hereby authorized to make any needed cut or excavation, doing as little damage to trees, shrubbery and other environments as possible either for an intake or outlet of any sewer, drain or water pipe.

Section 3. Any private owner of any lot or block so occupied or used of right of way, must file his complaint with the Recorder within thirty days from the completion of work done upon said premises.

Section 4. The Council shall promptly refer all claims for redress to a board of three arbitrators or appraisers for adjudication, whose decision shall be final with reference to all claims filed in so far as the City of Houlton is interested.

Section 5. Whenever the Council shall, by ordinance, provide for a system of sewers, drains or waste pipes in any sewer district, the Recorder shall notify the appraisers or arbitrators, transmitting to them a certified copy of said ordinance, and it shall be the duty of the said appraisers or arbitrators, and they are

hereby authorized and empowered to promptly proceed to make an equitable apportionment of the probable cost of said sewerage system among all the real estate owners in said district, basing said estimate upon the last preceding assessment of real estate only, and not upon the improvements thereon, and report the same to the Recorder.

Section 6. The Council is hereby fully authorized and empowered to assess, levy and collect all necessary taxes as required by Section 5 of this Chapter, to provide a lien docket, and to provide by ordinance for all things necessary and convenient for the complete enforcement of all provisions made by ordinance in accordance with existing State laws and in conformity to this Charter.

Section 7. The taxes levied and collected as provided in Section 6 of this Chapter shall be used only for the payment of the principal and the interest of aforesaid warrants, and said warrants shall be drawn in such form and denominations that said taxes or any part thereof may be made immediately applicable to the payment of some portion of said warrants.

Section 8. The Council of said City shall have power and authority to compel all persons erecting or maintaining privies, water closets, sinks, drains or cesspools within one hundred and sixty feet of any street or alley 18005—Flagg—7 P. L. C. F

in which a sewer has or may hereafter be constructed to connect the same therewith at their own cost and expense, and provide by ordinance that when the person erecting or maintaining said privies, water closets, cesspools, sinks or drains neglect or refuse after ten days' notice in writing, by the Recorder or Marshal, to so connect the same with said sewer, the City may make such connections and assess the cost thereof against the property upon which such privy, water closet or cesspool is situated.

Section 9. For the improvements above referred to, the Council is hereby authorized to issue warrants, based upon credit of the district so improved, to be known as Sewerage District Warrants, bearing interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable annually, and which said warrants shall be accepted at not less than par; said warrants to be issued from time to time as required to defray the expense of putting in said system of sewerage. The time of payment shall be designated by ordinance; payable in installments, but final payment shall not in any instance extend beyond the period of ten years.

CHAPTER 11 AS THE CITY OF HOULTON.

In all action and proceedings and in all matters wherein the town of Houlton is a party or interested in any way directly or indirectly, City shall be substituted; and all actions and proceedings wherein the town of Houlton is interested shall, by the City, be continued and conducted. All property, real, personal and mixed, and all rights and interests of the town of Houlton shall be and the same is the property of this City and all obligations of the town of Houlton are hereby assumed and shall be paid by the City in manner and form as the same where required to be paid by the town of Houlton.

FIRE PROTECTION.

In order to more effectively provide safeguards against fire, the Common Council is hereby authorized to incur a warrant indebtedness not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars, to be expended for fire hose cart ladders and other appliances.

SIDEWALKS.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Common Council to build and maintain good and substantial crosswalks at the intersection of any or all streets whereon the people have built sidewalks or otherwise.

Section 2. The Council is hereby authorized and empowered to require by ordinance the owner or owners of any lot, parcel or block of land in the City of Houlton to construct or build sidewalks abutting said lot, parcel or block of land, at the expense of the owner or owners thereof, and to maintain the same in good repair, said sidewalks shall be constructed of lumber not less than one and one-half inches in thickness, five feet in width, in the residential district and eight feet in width on all business streets, or cement sidewalks of same dimensions.

Section 3. Should any property holder for a period of thirty days neglect or refuse to build the sidewalk, or put it in proper repair when ordered by the Council so to do, the Council is hereby authorized and empowered to lay and have repaired the same, and to assess the cost thereof against the abutting property.

Section 4. To make effective the provisions of the foregoing Sections 1 and 3, the Council is hereby authorized to pass such needful ordinances as may be proper and necessary herefor, including an ordinance providing for the assessment, levy and collection of the costs and the sale and redemption of the property offending against Sections 2 and 3.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That this resolution for proposed Charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council be filed with the Recorder of the Town of Houlton upon its approval by the President of the Council for submission to the legal voters of the Town of Houlton for their rejection or approval to be voted on at a special election to be held on the 31st day of October, 1910, and to be held as by law in such cases made and provided.

Resolved further, that said Recorder be, and he is hereby instructed and required to publish this resolution together with the ballot title provided by the City Attorney at least once in the official newspaper of the Town of Houlton, or in case of no official paper in said town, then in the paper published nearest the said Town of Houlton, within thirty days immediately preceding said election.
