COUNTY COURT.

(Concluded from last week.)
 Matter of petition of Steve Lampa et al. for change in road, sections 35 and 36, T. 5 N., R. 2 W.—On this day comes on for hearing the petition of Steve Lampa and 18 others, fresholders of the county residing in the road district where said road is to be changed praying for a change in the county road as follows:
 Beginning at a post marked A, set in the county road near the corner of Secs. 35 and 36, T. 5 N., R. 2 W., running thence in a northerly direction along the center of the county road as now traveled a distance of 1325 feet, thence N. 4 degrees E., 100 feet; thence N. 46 degrees 30 minutes E., 100 feet; thence N. 40 degrees 5 minutes E., 100 feet; thence N., 31 degrees E., 100 feet; thence N. 14 degrees 10 minutes E., 100 feet; thence N. 5 degrees 15 minutes E., 100 feet; thence N. 5 degrees 25 minutes W., 100 feet; thence N. 16 degrees 38 minutes W., 200 feet; thence N. 22 degrees 52 minutes W., 468 feet to the 1/4 Sec. corner between Secs. 35 and 36, T. 5 N., R. 2 W.; thence N. 8 degrees W., 80 feet, to the center of the county road; thence northwesterly along the center of the present traveled county road to a stake marked R, set for the terminus of the Smith Road Survey.
 Said road to be 40 feet in width. And also to vacate the present county road between the point described herein be vacated.
 And it is satisfactorily appearing to the Court from proof filed herein that due notice of the pendency of this proceedings has been given as by law required, that more than twelve of said petitioners are legal freeholders of this county residing in the road district where said road is to be changed, and that a good and sufficient bond has been filed herein;
 It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of Viewers meet at Houston, on the 12th day of September, 1910, or on their failure to meet on that day, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey and change said road as prayed for in the petition and report the same to this Court.
 Matter of report of Board of Road Viewers on Clatskanie and Mist road:
 On this day the report of the Board of Viewers was read in open court for the first time.
 Matter of petition of W. E. Makinister and J. Nussbaumer for liquor license for Goble precinct for one year:
 On this day comes on for hearing the petition of W. E. Makinister and J. Nussbaumer for a license to sell spirituous, vinous and malt liquors and for-

meddled cider in less quantities than one gallon in Goble precinct.
 And it appearing to the Court that a majority of all the legal voters of said precinct, who are actual residents of said Goble precinct, and who have actually resided therein at least 30 days preceding the signing of said petition, have signed said petition; and it further appearing to the Court from the affidavit of the publisher of the Clatskanie Chief, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published in said county and State, that said petition together with a notice of the day upon which said petitioners would apply to this Court for such license had been published for four consecutive weeks in his said newspaper; and it further appearing from the affidavit of one of the signors of said petition and of two of the resident householders of said precinct, that written copies of said petition and notice had posted for four consecutive weeks in three of the most public places in said Goble Precinct, and the W. E. Makinister & J. Nussbaumer having filed with the Clerk of this Court a bond duly approved by the County Judge and a duplicate receipt of the County Treasurer for the sum of \$100.00 and there being no remonstrance against the granting of said license, and the Court being fully advised in the matter, It is therefore ordered by the Court that said petition be granted and that license issue to said W. E. Makinister & J. Nussbaumer to sell Spirituous, Vinous and Malt Liquors and Fermented Cider in less quantities than one gallon in Goble precinct for the period of one year from September 1st, 1910.
