PORTLAND WINS PENNANT.

Despite the ruling of Judge Graham, president of the Pacific Coast Baseball League, the Portland club won the pennant from the five California contenders. The race right up to the close of the season last Sunday was close and until about six weeks ago five of the contending teams were in reach of the flag. When the President of the league forfeited three games won by the Portland team to Oakland, their closest rivals, on a technicality, it was a severe blow, but the Oregon boys were too much for the Southerners despite the partiality of the rulers of the association. The official standing of the league at the end of the season is; Portland, 667; Oakland, 555; San Francisco, 518; Vernon, 514; Los Angeles, 453; Sacramento, 393. If the Portland boys had been treated fairly and the games had not been given to the California team they would have been the pennant winners by a margin of 40 points instead of 12.

YANKTON-PITTSBURG ROAD

Last Sunday's Oregonian devoted about two columns of space to a description of the fine new road on which County Surveyor Prescott and his surveying crew are now at work. The write up contains a large map of the county, and parts of it that are of particular local interest are given herewith:

What will undoubtedly be one of the grandest roads in Oregon is the Portland-Astoria-Beaches Road, upon which active work is now being pushed by the Columbia County and Clatsop County road engineers. When the road is completed it will give a fine, smooth, hard-surfaced boulevard connecting Portland and the beaches by automobile, the trip requiring only a few hours. This is the road fathered by Lewis Russell, a director of the Portland Automobile Club.

The road, though it must cross several mountain ranges, will have a grade of 3 per cent in Columbia County. In Clatsop County the grade will not be much more, except in one or two places. To make this easy climb possible, Columbia County surveyors have mapped out an almost entirely different route from Yankton to Pittsburg. Removing several hills of 15 and 20 per cent grade, the road between these points will necessarily be made a few miles longer, but the low grade will permit a motor car to make the added distance as easily as to climb the hills.

Columbia County will build 24 miles of road to make the new boulevard possible, Clatsop County will contribute more, while Multnomah County's roads all the way to the Columbia County line are in excellent condition. Columbia County has graded and graveled several miles of highway and work on the remainder of the road will be continued this winter.

If the estimates of the engineers at work on the road are not amiss, the road will be completed by next July, thereby giving plenty of time for the late summer beach travel. Men are at work on the Clatsop end of the highway.

The road is the result of agitation started by Portland, St. Helens, Astoria and beach points in 1908. The County Commissioners have been authorized to share the expense.

Under the supervision of County Surveyor Prescott, 14 men have been at work laying out the new road through the Columbia County hills. Columbia County's report of the road's progress will be ready to submit to the County Court in January. In the 24 miles of road mapped out, none will be more than of 3 per cent grade. This undertaking will cost \$60,000. Part of this large amount, however, will be met by individual subscriptions.

One of the benefits to be derived from the boulevard is shown by the Western Cooperaage Company, of Portland. This company owns ninety million feet of timber near Houlton, Columbia County, which it must remove within two years. This company plans to transport the timber on automobile trucks when the road is completed. This would reduce the cost of getting out the timber, and would also facilitate its removal. The cooperaage company, it is understood, is willing to contribute its share of the cost of the highway. Another firm, the Trenholm Orchard Company, which is planting 1000 acres near Yankton, is also willing to subscribe several thousand dollars to the fund.

From Portland the road leads through Linnton to Scappoose, and thence to St. Helens. From St. Helens to Yankton the road was graded and the grade reduced. A mile and a half beyond the road is now in good shape. At Yankton the road will branch off and a new route following Milton Creek and numerous other little streams will be taken until the top of the ridge is reached. This will make a 3 per cent grade all the way. At the top of the ridge connection with the little Nehalem River Valley will be made and this will be followed until Pittsburg is reached.
